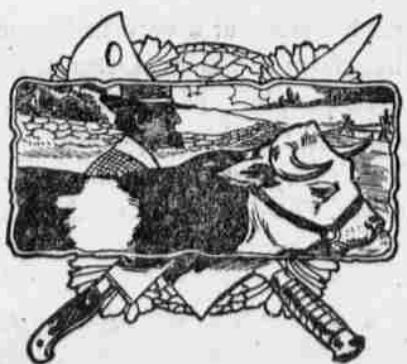

MRS. SHORT WINS IN CIRCUIT COURT

Judge Hamilton Reverses Decision of Justice Pennock Concerning Residence Property.

The decision of Judge Hamilton in the case of D. L. Rood vs. Mrs. Maud Short has just been received here. It reverses the decision of Justice Pennock on the first hearing and is a victory for Mrs. Short. The case aroused considerable interest as it involved the residence property where the Shorts reside. Mr. Rood originally owned the property but the Shorts secured it on a contract. Mr. Rood alleged violation of the contract in failure to pay and started proceedings to eject them. He secured a judgment in the justice court but C. F. McKnight appealed from the decision to the Circuit courts. Judge Hamilton held that the suit should have been against Mr. and Mrs. Short instead of simply against Mrs. Short and consequently reversed Justice Pennock's decision. This leaves Mr. and Mrs. Short in possession of the property.
