

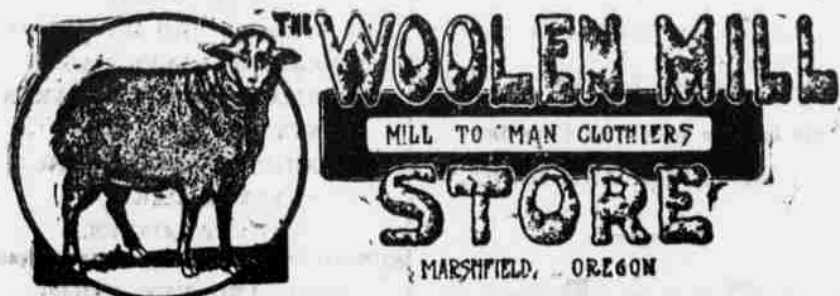

Chicken Feed High.—Chicken feed is now selling at the rate of about \$50 per ton on the Bay, the highest it has been in years. This is a poor grade wheat. Dealers say there is not the margin of profit in it even at that rate there was when they were selling it at \$25 per ton. The advance in the price of wheat makes it almost impossible to obtain the low grade wheat. Rolled barley is now being shipped in from San Francisco, for the first time in a year or more.
