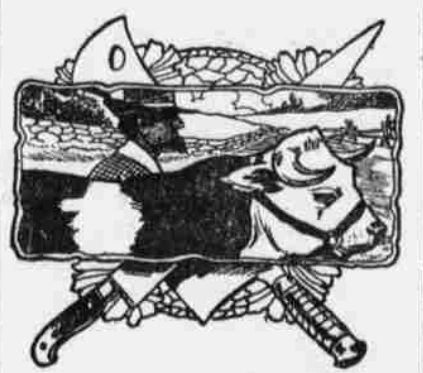

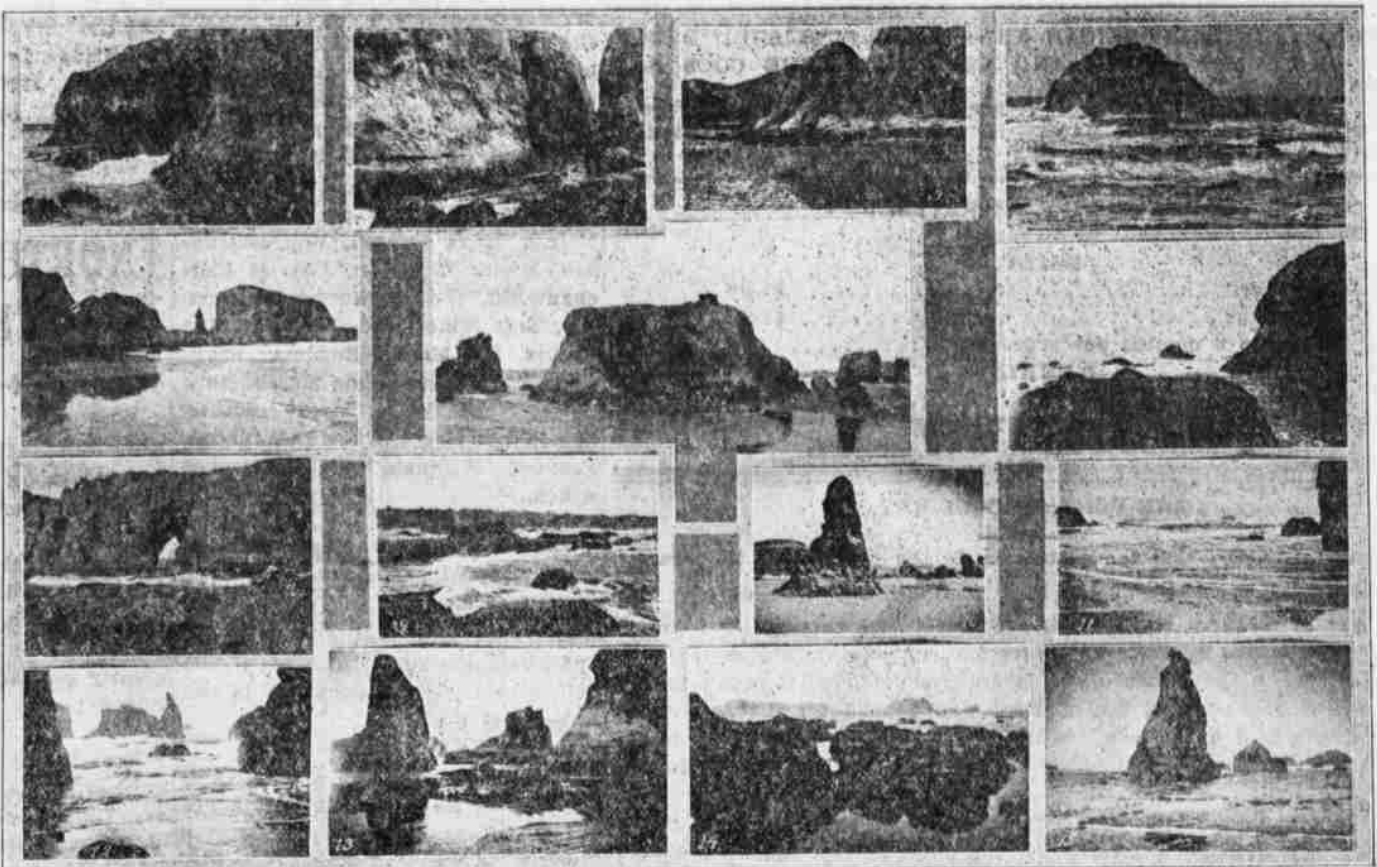

SELL MANY APPLES.

Washington Growers Find Market Abroad For Them.

An apple grower in the Wenatchee (Wash.) district who took 70,000 boxes of his choice apples to Australia, China, Japan, and New Zealand, the past winter returned lately and has orders booked from those countries for 150,000 boxes of the current year's crop. Another grower in the same section, who shipped several carloads of apples to England, has orders for many thousands of boxes of the new fruit; crop to be shipped next fall. It is expected that many more orders for the fruit of that Washington district will be received from foreign markets. So it is evident that it pays well to seek a new market when the local ones are overstocked.
