RAILROADS AND THE KEY CITY.

RUMORS OF RAILROADS fill the air. From one end of the Pacific slope to the other Coos Bay is being discussed as a railroad necessity. This has been the case, as the oldest inhabitant can remember, for thirty years and more. It is quite true that during all those years a railroad into Coos Bay was not as much needed as today, but there have been times when it seemed nearer to materializing than it does now. Still, the present conditions not only justify but demand a railroad from Coos Bay to the outside world and the demand has become so positive and pronounced that the whole Northwest is repeating it.

Why should the demand of a comparatively small city like those which hold Coos Bay, be regarded with so much concern? The answer is very simple and very plain. It is because Coos Bay is the key to two thirds of the undeveloped state of Oregon. It is because the Port of Coos Bay is the Key City of the state. It is because the Harbor of Coos Bay is the only great harbor on the coast of Oregon. It is because there are 150,000 people in Southwestern Oregon who are nearer to the cheap water transportation of Coos Bay than to that of either San Francisco or Portland. It is because the 150,000 people of Southwestern Oregon import \$15,000,000 worth of clothing, dry goods, groceries, hardware, furniture and other manufactured articles every year, and pay the long haul railroad rates when, if a short railroad were built from the Harbor of Coos Bay to Roseburg, the freight rates would be reduced by at least fifty per cent. It is because the same people who import \$15,000,000 worth, in order to pay for the imports, must do export \$20,000,000 worth of products per year and would be able to save on that and increase the output if they could dispatch it by sea through the only harbor—Coos Bay.

It is not to be disputed that a railroad between Coos Bay and Roseburg would handle all the traffic involving the imports and exports which would cross Coos Bay's bar. The near future will see the Panama canal opened. The result will be that all fabrics, hardware and manufactured articles can be floated by water from the east where they are manufactured and laid down at Coos Bay for less money than they can be brought from Portland now. The building of a railroad from Coos Bay to Roseburg will make Coos Bay a great jobbing center and Roseburg a great interior distributing point. It will cause many large houses to put branches here in order to supply an already large trade. It will take, neither from Portland's nor San Francisco's business, but simply cause the goods now supplied by those two cities to be landed here at small cost by water, rather than dropped at a number of small points at large cost by long railroads. The people of Southwestern Oregon owe it to themselves to see that the railroad which is so necessary and so plainly profitable is built.
