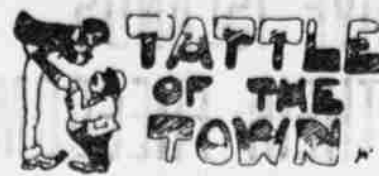

Funeral Not Arranged.—As yet, no date has been set for the funeral of J. F. Fox who met his death on a launch in Coal Bank Inlet Saturday. His brother, Dr. Thomas Fox of Portland, is expected here today and his two sisters who are in the Sisters of Mercy Communities at Tillamook and Beaverton will arrive tomorrow or next day. The funeral will be from the Catholic church.

Ball Player Killed.—George McCutcheon received word today that Parke Bryan who played with the Marshfield baseball team the early part of last season had been killed in an accident in the Spaulding Lumber Mill at Newberg, Ore. Newberg is the old home of Mr. McCutcheon and Mr. Bryan. Late last season, Mr. Bryan returned to Newberg and has since been employed in the mill. His skull was crushed, causing almost instant death.

Council Tonight.—The Marshfield city council will meet tonight. Rumors that there is likely to be a clash over the confirmation between Mayor Straw and the council over the appointment of two new members to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of F. A. Sacchi and Herbert Lockhart have been rife and when the names of the mayor's selections, W. R. Haines and G. W. Carleton, are presented tonight, there promises to be a lively session.

Almost a Fire.—Had it not been for the awakening of Mr. Mulloy a new nights ago, there would undoubtedly have been a serious fire near J. W. Bennett's residence. Mr. Mulloy who was sleeping in the office of his livery barn thought he heard a crackling like flames eating into dry wood and started to investigate. He found that an ash box near J. W. Bennett's barn and just in the rear of the Mulloy barn had caught fire from some hot cin-

ders that Mr. Bennett's Jap servant had emptied into it. He extinguished it with a few pails of water.

Libby Pioneer Buried.—George Vernon, a well-known Libby pioneer, who succumbed a few days ago after a long illness, was buried in Marshfield yesterday. Mr. Vernon came here from California about thirty years ago and settled on a large ranch where he had lived continuously since. He is survived by a wife and an adopted son.

Placed Under Bonds.—Messrs. Galley and Donovan of Coaledo, have been held to the circuit court on the charge of selling liquor in less than gallon lots when they only have a government license, and also for selling liquor to minors. They were arrested last Friday on an old indictment on order of Deputy Prosecuting Attorney L. A. Liljeqvist but furnished bonds for their appearance before the circuit court, Messrs. McPherson and Mirrasoul acting as their security.

Major McIndoe Coming.—Captain Peters of the dredge Oregon, has been informed that Major McIndoe in charge of the government work on this coast, expects to come here from Portland the latter part of this week or the first of next to inspect the work now underway here and also to arrange for future work. The dredge is now doing excellent work filling the property south of Mill Slough but will probably have to go on the regular government project about the first of next week.

SAY LEAGUE HAS NOT ACTED

Claims Citizens' League Will Not Interfere With Mayor's Appointments.

Editor Times: In my judgment, your editorial of last evening is unjust to the Citizens League of Marshfield. The League has taken no action whatever as to the vacancies in the city council either before or since the announcement of Mayor Straw's appointments to fill these vacancies. Therefore, how can the League be exceeding its authority in this matter? It is true some members have expressed themselves at to the course that should be pursued, but the League has taken no action.

Furthermore the League is not attempting to dictate to anyone. The members of the council are not bound in any way. They are free to exercise their own judgment in this as in all other matters.

You say: "Now is the time to get together. Let past differences be buried." So far as boosting Marshfield and Coos Bay is concerned I believe we are together. The League has been contending for certain principles in city government. If these principles were right last fall, they are right today and should not be buried. When the League has believed Mayor Straw to be right it has stood with him. For example the purchase of the lot for the extension of 'B' street. But when in its judgment he has been wrong it has not hesitated to take issue with him.
