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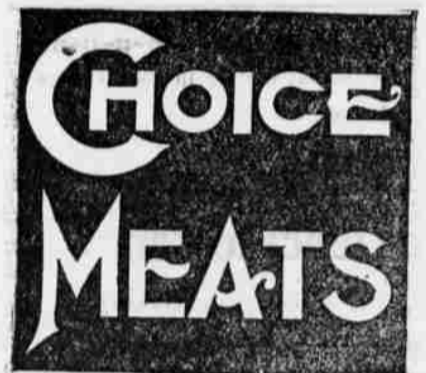

Following the closing of the deal, Mr. Lewis announces that they, accompanied by Miss Muriel Lewis, will leave for Wales to secure the inheritance which he has fallen heir to there.
