COOS RIVER INCIDENT.

Steamer Coos River Had Narrow Escape Last Thursday Morning.

COOS RIVER, April 3. — What might have been a very disastrous fire, occurred on the steamer Coos River, last Thursday morning while en route from S. C. Roger's place to Marshfield.

When the boat was a short distance below Daniel's Creek, one of the passengers turned in an alarm of fire. By the time the pumps, hose, etc., were manned, smoke and flames were pouring from the after parts of the little vessel, and it seemed the destruction of the boat was imminent.

The agility shown by the steamboat crew and especially, that displayed by Herbert Rogers in his management of the hose, proves the value of the fire drilling which the crew has received the last few years. Two of the passengers were quite conspicuous for the gallantry they showed in fighting the flames. Their ardor, however, was a trifle dampened by Herbert Rogers who promptly turned the hose into the cabin, extinguishing the flames, and incidentally drenching all other objects.

Some wonder was felt as to the origin of the fire, for although the cabins were smoke blackened, nothing was burned except a quantity of papers and nothing was damaged except the feelings of Mr. Rogers, who found it necessary to scrub the cabin. He felt well repaid for his labors, however, in the fact that some of his passengers, as well as a part of his boat, had received a washing.

The only visible effects of the fire were fully described by a passenger who on entering the cabin looked about in amazement and exclaimed: "They have scrubbed!"
