Hears Contest.—United States Land Commissioner L. A. Liljeqvist is today hearing the contest of Fred Muetzel and Frank Bowron over a claim at Ten Mile. A large number of witnesses have been called in for the hearing.

Go to Coquille.—Col. Wm. Grimes and several others went to Coquille today to meet delegations from other Coos county towns which will urge the Coos county commissioners to make a liberal appropriation for a Coos county exhibit at the Seattle fair this summer.

Catholic Services.—Special services will be conducted at the Catholic church Thursday morning at 9 o'clock. Also Friday morning at 9 o'clock and Friday evening at 7:30. Saturday, confessions will be heard at St. Monica's church from 2 to 4 o'clock in the afternoon and from 7 to 9 o'clock in the evening.

Fire at Eastside.—While heating tar on the kitchen stove yesterday

afternoon, the kettle overflowed and caused considerable damage to that room of the O. P. Noah house in Eastside yesterday. Of course, the boiling tar caught fire and for a few minutes, it looked as though the whole house might go. Mr. Noah by valiant efforts during which his hair was badly singed, succeeded in staying the conflagration and extinguished the fire before serious damage was done.

Broke Into Gow Why's.—Gow Why yesterday discovered that someone had cut out a window in the rear of his store. Whether anything was stolen or not, Gow has been unable to ascertain. Marshal Carter is investigating the case. The window through which an entrance was effected is in a position difficult to reach owing to the proximity of the buildings in the rear, the thief having to climb over a shed and down into a narrow place.

Stuck in the Mud.—The new fill by the dredge in Railroad Addition is causing grief for a number. Sunday, A. T. Haines' horse got away and trotted down the Broadway fill. The first thing the animal knew, it had struck a soft spot in the fill and it went in as far it could go. Mr. Haines and others succeeded in extricating the animal before she had injured herself. Saturday two children of Captain A. H. Olson of the Esther Buhne, started across the soft fill and they went in a couple of feet. They were finally rescued by Herman Hillyer who built a walk out to them.

Local Cases Up.—A. J. Sherwood of Coquille, and J. M. Blake of Marshfield, left via Drain this morning for Salem where they will argue some local cases in the Supreme Court. Mr. Sherwood is now attorney for the Southern Pacific in this section, being appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of J. S. Coke to accept the judgeship. Francis H. Clarke leaves on the Alliance today for Salem where he will also appear in the same cases. The suits are those of Ferrari vs. The Beaver Hill Coal Company for personal injuries, Ferrari having been given a verdict for \$6,000 in the circuit court. The other case is the action of Abel vs. the Coos Bay-Roseburg and Eastern Railway. Messrs. Blake and Clarke represent Ferrari and Abel.
