Succumbs at General Hospital This Morning—Had Been in This Section For Many Years.

Joseph Baud, a French timberman and logger, who has been in and around Coos Bay for several years, died at the General hospital this morning. He had been ailing for a week but not until yesterday was his condition thought serious enough to call a physician. The doctor immediately had him sent to the hospital but it was too late to do anything for him.

But little is known of Baud. He was quiet and told few of his past history. He was about seventy years old and is understood to have participated in some of the French wars. He will be buried from the Temple & Wilson Undertaking Parlors Thursday afternoon.
