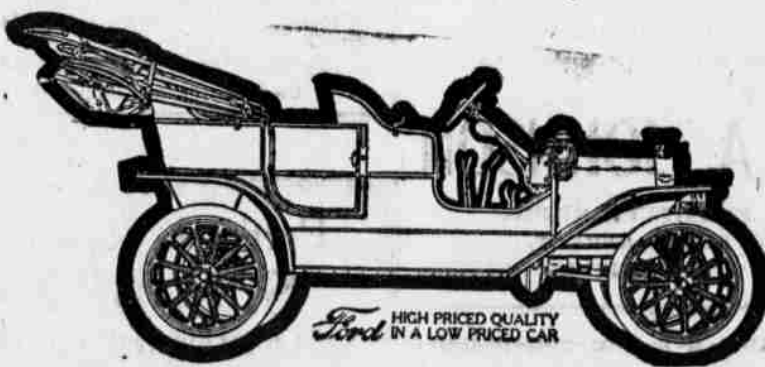

HERE'S A DUCK THAT IS 3,000,000 YEARS OLD

Other Mammoth Creatures of Yesterday Compared With This One Dug Out of the Fossil Beds of Wyoming and Sent to Museum.

NEW YORK, April 7.—Dr. Herman C. Bumpus director of the American Museum of Natural History, announced the acquisition by the museum of a number of fossils of extraordinary scientific interest, chief of which is a mummified dinosaur, which is believed to be about three million years old. This specimen is a nearly complete skeleton of the trachodon, or duck, in which not only the bones but the greater part of the skin of the head, body and legs are preserved intact. It was found in a soft sandstone stratum near Lance Creek, Wyo.

"Mummies of Egypt, three or four thousand years old," said Dr. Bumpus recently, "are considered to be of respectable antiquity, and still more venerable are the mammoths found buried in the frozen tundras of Siberia and Alaska, but even the mammoths tens of thousands of years old are only creatures of yesterday, compared with the antiquity of this dinosaur mummy."

The museum has also purchased two other specimens of marine reptiles from the Kansas chalk beds, a little older, even than the formation in which the trachodon was found. One is a skeleton of the marine turtle, and the other a fine skull of the mosasaurian, or swimming lizard.

There are also two specimens of comparatively recent geographical age, a skull of the extinct long horned bison, six feet from tip to tip of the horns, and a lower jaw of the Imperial mammoth, both from the Pleistocene deposits of Kansas.

UNCLE SAM'S RANGERS PLAY MANGY TRICK ON THE WOLVES

STURGIS S. D., April 7. — As a result of a trick played by the government, it seems likely that the old range country this side of the Missouri river will at last be rid of a great many of the wolves that have been the terror of stock growers.

Under direction from Washington, rangers of the Black Hills forest reserve set traps in which they caught something over 100 wolves, without seriously injuring them. Then these wolves were confined in an inclosure, surrounded by a high fence, and infected with the mange.

After the disease had made good headway, the animals were released. As a result farmers are finding dead wolves and others are so weak and emaciated that they are easily killed with clubs.

WHEN A DOZEN ISN'T A DOZEN.

PITTSBURG, Pa., April 7.—There was a row at 48 Aurelia street when Mrs. J. Wagner came in with a dozen eggs she had borrowed from Mrs. Mary Brown.

Mrs. Brown declared that a dozen eggs would not square matters, as she had loaned her neighbor a dozen when they were 50 cents, and now he price was 20 cents.

Mrs. Wagner announced that a dozen eggs was all she would return, and then, it was charged, Mrs. Wagner began to chuck the eggs at the borrower.

After the police had straightened things out Alderman Young put the women under bonds to keep peace.

PREACHER WINS IN TEXAS CASE

Rev. Geo. Clark Summers of Gardiner Freed On First Trial In South.

Rev. George Clark Summers, who figured quite conspicuously here some months ago, having been arrested at Gardiner, Douglas county, on telegraphic information from Texas officials, was acquitted of the charge at his trial which occurred at Graham, Texas, last week. The Throckmorton Times of March 26, has this to say of the Summers case: "The Rev. G. C. Summers' trial at Graham last week resulted in an acquittal. Summers was tried for obtaining money under false pretenses. He was brought back from Oregon about three months ago to Throckmorton county. The Throckmorton case is the same as the Young County case and we suppose that trial will settle the suit here. Summers skipped from here more than four years ago with the organist of the Methodist church, he being the pastor in charge, leaving his wife and three children on the mercy of the world. The money from which these bills grew out of was borrowed from members of his church here and in Young county. He, Summers, claimed that he was suffering from appendicitis and in order to get relief he would have to go to Kansas City and have an operation performed. We have been reliably informed that while pastor here he represented the Christian Advocate, and collected money for that paper but never turned it into those people.

"We understand he says he will pay Throckmorton a visit shortly and administer corporal punishment to several of the Throckmorton citizens, especially the Sheriff's force."

UMPQUA TO SUPPLY LOGS.

The Roseburg News Says: "The building of another large saw mill at Gardiner indicates there is capital that believes there will be a revival in the lumber tariff the present year, and very likely it also means the construction of an electric line of railroad up the North Umpqua at an early date to tap the heavily timbered tracts on the headwaters of the stream named and its tributaries. It has been known to a few for some time that a route for such a line has been looked over, rights of way secured, and estimates of cost of construction made, but to what use the line would be put has been kept very close. Rapids in the river above Winchester make rafting of logs to Gardiner a difficult task, but an electric line from above Glendale and tapping Cavit Creek to a point below where the Umpqua rivers join would make getting logs to Gardiner both safe and easy. By putting one and one together two is easily made, and it is safe to say that the new mill will tap the forests on the North Umpqua."

"CHURCH SALOON"

WILL BE OPENED MONTCLAIR, N. J., April 7.—A number of well-known churchmen of Montclair are planning to open a model saloon similar to the one operated for a time by Bishop Potter in New York.

The movement was started at a church meeting recently. At the next period for filing applications for liquor licenses steps will be taken to get a license for the ideal saloon.

Besides the spirituous drinks, the "church saloon" will furnish coffee, lemonade and soft drinks as well as light luncheons. Qualified bartenders will be employed at nominal salaries.

Their income, however, will be largely augmented by the commissions on sales of nonintoxicants and foodstuffs.

MAGNET DRAWS BALL FROM EAR

WHITEHALL, Mich., April 7. — Jerome Schener, a 10-year-old boy, was the victim of a peculiar accident. Another boy in the schoolroom threw a small steel ball bearing at Jerome, and the missile entered his ear, working its way into his head, despite the efforts of the doctors to remove it. Young Schener soon became unconscious. He was finally removed to the Hackley hospital in Muskegon, and a large magnet was used to draw out the ball.
