Reynolds Mill Resumes.—The Reynolds sawmill on Pony Inlet, which has been closed down for a few days has resumed operations.

Organize Baseball Team.—Baseball fans at Eastside are organizing a baseball team for the coming season. Arrangements are being made to give a benefit dance there April 17 to secure funds to buy uniforms and paraphernalia.

Opens Branch Store.—Mrs. A. G. Aiken has opened a branch millinery store in Coquille. She will make occasional visits there to look after it but will devote most of her time to her Marshfield store.

County Commissioners Adjourn.—Judge Hall and Commissioner E. A. Anderson returned today from Coquille where they have been attending an adjourned meeting of the county commissioners. Numerous road matters were adjusted.

Frizeen Is Administrator.—August Frizeen has been appointed administrator of the estate of Axel Carlson whose body was found in Isthmus Inlet ten days ago. A letter has been received by officers of the C. A. Smith mill, it is stated.

from a brother of Axel Carlson. The latter resides in North Dakota. Mr. Frizeen will communicate with him about the disposition of the estate which, so far as now known, consists merely of a deposit of about \$250 in a bank at Ottawa, Canada.

Breakwater In Tonight.—Agent W. F. Miller received a telegram this morning announcing that the Breakwater left Astoria at 6:10 this morning. Unless unexpectedly delayed, she will reach here about 10 o'clock tonight. The Czarina left San Francisco today for Coos Bay.

To Return Hounds.—Two of the three Harriman hounds which Col. Holabird sent to Col. Grimes last fall for "Varmint" hunting in this section, will be returned to Harriman's summer home at Pelican Lodge. They will be shipped from here on the Breakwater. One of the hounds will be kept here for breeding.

Plans Box Factory.—A. F. Estabrook of the A. F. Estabrook Company, which operates the steamers Bandon and Elfield between Coos Bay and Bandon and San Francisco, is figuring on starting a box factory on the Coquille. He has not made any official announcement but is said to be figuring on the cost of the kind of a plant he wishes to put in.

To Appeal Matter.—Councilman Coke stated yesterday that he does not propose to abide by the decision of Mayor Straw and City Attorney Snover that Mayor Straw's appointment of W. R. Haines to fill a vacancy on the council stands. Mr. Coke said that he would carry the matter to the courts if necessary as he is sure that Mr. Snover's interpretation of the charter on the number of votes required to reject the appointment is not correct. The matter will come to a show down next Tuesday night, probably, when it is expected that Mr. Haines will claim his seat in the council. At the last session, Mr. Haines was not present, being in Bandon on business. As yet, Mayor Straw has not announced whom he will appoint in place of G. W. Carleton.
