NEW EUROPEAN WATERWAY PROJECT

WATERWAY IMPROVEMENT

Indisputably proposed in Europe is one of the most important ever brought forward in that continent. The plan, which is especially backed by American engineers, is to construct a 1,000-foot canal, with a depth of 10 feet, to connect the Danube system with the Aegean Sea, forming direct water communication between Central Europe and the Mediterranean. Most of the traffic now between these sections goes to ports on the North Sea, and thence through the Atlantic to the Gibraltar gateway. It is said that the Danube-Aegean Canal can be built for \$70,000,000 and that an American company, backed by American capital, is ready to undertake the work.

Austria has shown of late a desire to count for more in marine commerce. No other nation of its size and importance is so extensively out of touch with the sea, though its capitals are on the greatest river of the continent. Germany's progress has been largely associated with its growing ocean traffic and hermetism of inland waterways. Austria's population of 20,000,000 includes 14,000,000 Germans, and the Hungarian and Bohemian elements are large and enterprising. One of the first signs of a Greater Austria is the movement to open the waterways permanently, enlarge the ports and extend the coast line. In Europe there is no longer need to outvise the people of the value of unaided, unaided rivers and unaided harbors.

While Europe with its centuries of experience is thus spending millions for the improvement and development of its waterways there are some knitters on Coos Bay who object to the formation of a Port Commission to care for and improve what may be made one of the greatest natural harbors in the world. The Times has too great a faith in the intelligence and progressive spirit of Coos Bay to think that much heed will be given to these senseless and selfish objections.

The Port Commission will be one of the greatest agencies for the advancement of Coos Bay and any man who owns a dollar's worth of property or expects to make his home here should vote for it.

LOCKWOOD TO QUIT.
