Two New Houses.—Messrs. Hyde and Bonebrake are erecting two fine new residences in Railroad Addition, north and east of the A. H. Powers' home.

Mrs. Straw Better.—Word from Santa Rosa is that Mrs. E. E. Straw who has been suffering considerably from her eyes is much improved. It seems that she accidentally got some lime or other foreign substance in her eyes that caused intense suffering for sometime. She may return with Dr. Straw next week.

Find Vein of Coal.—Workmen on the logging road which the Smith Powers Logging Company is building up Isthmus Inlet unearthed a big vein of coal. By some, it is thought to be the continuation of a Beaver Hill vein. It is likely that a shaft will be sunk to determine the extent of the vein. It is on land belonging to the Smith-Powers Company.

Put In Plank.—Robert Marsden and other North Front street property owners are getting tired of the bad condition of the street and the slight prospect of getting a permanent pavement put in this year. Mr. Marsden is having the temporary plank taken up and is putting in a good plank street. Other property owners have signified their intention of doing the same thing.

Council Tonight.—The Marshfield city council will meet tonight. There is little business of importance that the council can transact owing to the lack of a full membership. It was hoped that Mayor Straw who was called to Santa Rosa, Cal., last week by the illness of his wife might return on the M. F. Plant yesterday in order that a number of matters could be taken up but as he didn't they will have to be postponed another week.

Delay Ferry Slip.—The Coos county commissioners are getting irate over the delay in having the

ferry slip put in and declare that unless the Marshfield city council gets busy and has it fixed, the East-side ferry will be transferred to some other point. They say that the council has been dilly-dallying along with the matter for several months and Councilman Nelson who was instructed by the council to see that the slip was repaired says that he has been unable to secure a dredge to do the necessary work. The commissioners, however, say they can't wait much longer.

Open Store Here.—The Bayside Paint Company of North Bend, is planning to open a retail paint and paper store in the Coos building in Marshfield. It is also figuring on starting a paint factory on North Front street.

To Start Colony Here.—Count Karl Schoof arrived on the M. F. Plant yesterday to look over the Coos Bay section with a view to bringing a colony of German agriculturists here.

Alliance Owner Here.—Prentiss N. Gray, one of the owners of the Alliance, came up from Frisco yesterday to look after business interests here. He expects to spend about a week here arranging for his company to take over the warehouse now known as the F. S. Dow warehouse. He is accompanied by his brother-in-law, Roger Sherman of Salt Lake City.

Show Pleased.—The Coos County Stock Company presented "Who's Your Wife?" at the Masonic last night to a rather small audience, the attendance not being near what the performance merited. The comedy was pronounced by many present to have been one of the best ever seen in Marshfield. Mr. Mong and his company appear to be suffering from the dire effects of Marshfield audiences having been "done" by poor companies in the past. A few more shows like last night's, though, and the company will get the patronage they deserve.

Talk On Sin.—An audience that taxed the seating capacity of St. Monica's Catholic church last night greeted the Rev. Father W. L. Polk who is conducting mission services there.
