JACKSON COUNTY "WET."

Medford, Exempt From Local Option Law, Had No Right to Vote.

Medford Tribune: The final chapter in the famous Medford liquor case of Hall vs. Dunn, in which the Supreme Court held that Medford's charter was superior to the local option law of the state, has been written. Judge Hanna, on Wednesday, issued a permanent injunction to restrain the county court from closing these saloons.

The saloons have never been closed, as a temporary restraining order was issued just after the decision of the Supreme Court upholding the Medford charter. Judge Hanna in making the injunction permanent states that he does so on the ground that if the Medford charter nullifies the local option law of the state that the citizens of Medford had no legal right to vote on the question that affects the other portions of the county.

will be done. Let this suit should be delayed and the matter attacked at a time when it might hinder some needed improvement, the idea of the officials of the Chambers of Commerce is to have it settled as early as possible.

It is not believed that such a suit would interfere with the workings of the Port of Coos Bay for the present. For sometime, the Port Commission, after the members have been selected by Governor Benson, will be kept busy with preliminary work, such as securing an engineer and adopting a plan for work immediately necessary and making it conform with the general plan for future improvement. Of course, these plans must conform with the government plans and procedure.

While over a year must elapse before the port commission can have any available funds from a tax levy, necessary money can be obtained earlier through bonding if the commissioners decide it is advisable.

Ran Out of Ballots.

In the Coos city precinct, about twenty-five were unable to vote owing to the lack of ballots. County Clerk Watson sent the precinct twenty-five ballots, a few more than the registration list showed that there were voters in the precinct but a large number of voters have been moved there by the logging camp which the Smith-Powers Company opened in that vicinity some months ago. Consequently yesterday, at least fifty men tried to vote there and only twenty-five could be accommodated.

A number of ballots were thrown out as a result of being incorrectly marked. In South Marshfield, for instance, eighteen wrote the word "Yes" on their ballots instead of making the cross in the proper place. There were thrown out.

Will Recommend Men.

As soon as the Coos county court certifies the results of the election, which will be on next Monday, the Marshfield and North Bend Chambers of Commerce will recommend to Governor Benson the names of certain men to be appointed commissioners.

Just who the bodies will be recommended is not known. North Bend is said to be in favor of W. P. Evans and J. C. Gray, the agreement prior to election having been that North Bend should have two of the five commissioners and Marshfield three. There is now some talk that instead of taking three Marshfield may take two and the fifth man will then be selected to represent the outside territory. Capt. Harris of Sumner has been suggested as the fifth man in case this is done.

A dozen or so Marshfield men are being mentioned for the appointments. Among them are: Henry Sengstacken, J. W. Bennett, W. S. McFarland, Wm. Grimes, Dr. J. T. McCormac, Dr. E. Mings, G. W. Carleton and others.

N. C. Nielsen and Chas. Long have gone on a prospecting trip to Salmon Mountain, where they expect to

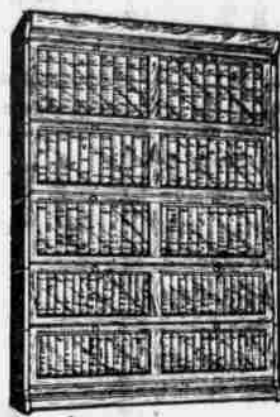

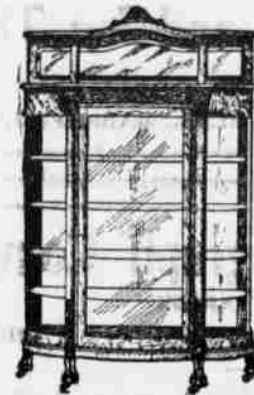
