FILL NORTH OF MILL SLOUGH

Dredge Oregon Will Soon Start Work On "Sawdust Flat" Section.

The dredge Oregon will start the fill of the "sawdust flat" north of Mill Slough and west of Broadway Friday or Saturday and will rush the work to completion. The fill of the railroad yards will be completed tomorrow night or early Friday and then Capt. Peters will move the dredge up opposite the Alliance docks and start pumping into Anderson avenue, formerly D street. Most of the owners of the unimproved property in the flat around the Chandler and down to Mill Slough have signed to have their property filled so that the whole section is likely to be raised to grade, making one of the best improvements in the "sawdust" flat that has been made in years.

When this fill is completed, the dredge will move on up and run a pipe down Commercial avenue, formerly 'B' street and fill the streets and some of the property in that section.

As soon as this is completed, the dredge will begin work on the regular government project of clearing the channel the cost of which will be defrayed by the \$25,000 transferred from the jetty fund. The dredge will work along down the channel from Marshfield, cutting off the shoals and straightening it out. This project will take several months. There is some talk of putting on a night crew and hastening this work so that it can be completed about August 1.
