

# CALL OUT FOR WEISER SESSION

Oregon-Idaho Development Congress to Meet There April 30.

With the port commission plan adopted, it is likely that Coos Bay men will now resume their activity about the proposed railroad and will undoubtedly resume their activity in the Oregon-Idaho Development Congress which is working to unite the sections affected on the proposition. In this connection the call by Reilly Atkinson, secretary of the Boise Commercial Club, for the next session of the Congress is of interest here. It is as follows:

"The next session of the Oregon-Idaho Development Congress will be held at Weiser, April 30 and May 1 and 2. The sessions of this organization have increased in interest every month, and have come to be the most important meetings held in these two states.

"The purpose and object of the Oregon-Idaho Congress is to develop the country through the building of railroads, and the meetings are held every month in order that the interest may be kept up and the advertising continued until something is done.

"Your club should by all means have delegates at the Weiser convention. You should show your faith in Idaho and your belief in its future by lending your moral support to the Congress and by giving the delegates, there present, the

benefit of any ideas you may have in this regard.

"The Congress has succeeded in having the law passed through the Idaho legislature which, when it is put into operation, will unquestionably enable us to build railroads. This law is at present the only loophole in the railroad situation.

"There is no question before the people of Idaho today which is as important as that of transportation, and this is the first definite movement to be started which holds good promise of success.

"Please make it your business to see that your club is represented at Weiser and to send as strong a delegation as possible."

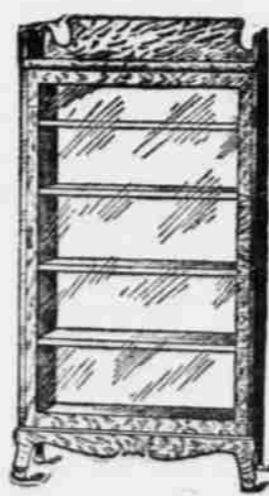

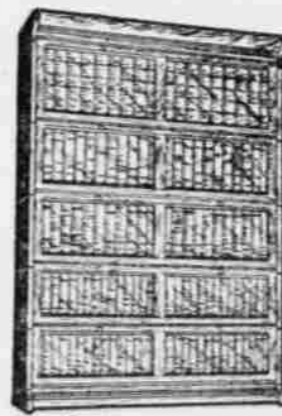

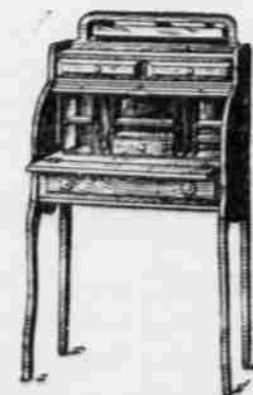
