OCEAN MAIL SERVICE.

Steamers to Carry It Between Portland and Eureka.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 23. — Portland and Eureka, Cal., are likely to have direct mail service in the near future, Postmaster Young having assurances that bids for contracts will soon be received in Washington. The Chamber of Commerce of this city has been working on the project for several years, but up to this time there has been little sign of success.

Eureka is a flourishing city on the coast of California, a short distance south of the Oregon boundary, but it has no mail connection with Portland, except by the roundabout way of San Francisco. A letter takes a full week or more in passing from one city to the other, although in a straight line they are not more than 400 miles apart.

"Eureka, being an important lumber town, her business men need a lot of Portland machinery and supplies," said Secretary Giltner. "But under the present conditions San Francisco has all the trade, although not so well equipped for it as is Portland."

"With two coasting steamers, giving us a five-day communication with Eureka, there is no excuse for the government not letting a mail contract, and with strong presentation of the case from Postmaster Young and our delegation in Congress, I think we will have the mail route established within a short time. It will mean a whole lot to us and to points on the coast to California now dependent altogether on San Francisco for a market and a base of supplies."

An economical retainer in which to ship products such as cement, lime and plaster is described in Popular Mechanics. The cost of the barrel is about \$1, which is a little more than twice that of a wooden barrel, but they are said to be good for at least fifteen round trips, and the room which they occupy when empty cuts down the shipping bill one-half.

Judge Kersten of Chicago, recently sentenced three highwaymen to imprisonment in the penitentiary for life. The trio had been arrested for holding up a citizen with revolvers and demanding his money. He allowed them to make a search, and it yielded just 46 cents. The severe sentence was made possible by an act passed two years ago, providing life imprisonment for highway robbery whenever deadly weapons are shown to compel the victim to surrender.

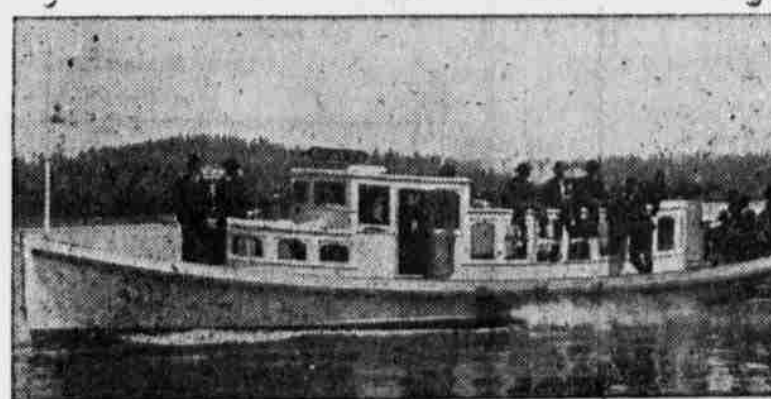
