## THE ROSEBURG RAILROAD.

THE PORT OF COOS BAY, having been voted into existence, and the future of the Bay being thereby assured, the next great proposition for the people to take up with all the energy they can master, is the acquisition of a right of way between the Bay and Roseburg. It was recently intimated in a letter which appeared in The Times signed "A Patient Waiter" that those who had taken up the matter of acquiring such a right of way through a local company, might be seeking to obtain it in order to turn it over to Mr. Harriman's company with a view to bottling up the Bay. The suggestion was entirely unfair, and without the slightest foundation. The men who have the local movement in charge are intent on getting a right of way which will not pass into the hands of any company unless that company pledges itself to build a railroad on it within a very reasonable time on pain of forfeiture of any right to use it.

The people of Coos Bay need a railroad. It is not enough to have a Port-Rails and trains are necessary. Unless this local company is assisted with local funds to survey and acquire a right of way between Coos Bay and the outer world, it is more than probable—yes, it is certain—that all the passes will be taken and retained by the very combination which the people fear and thereby a state aided railroad and a road built into Oregon by any other company will be blocked in its attempt to reach Coos Bay. It is a fact which has come to the knowledge of The Times that unless the people of Coos Bay acquire a right of way to Roseburg, their opportunity may disappear altogether.

It is absurd to charge anybody locally as "Patient Waiter" did with adding the Southern Pacific to "bottle up the Bay." The local company which proposes to acquire a right is composed of men who have every reason to want the bay developed and a railroad built. It is positively asserted and the policy has been adopted that no transfer of the rights of the local company will be made to anybody or any company except on the absolute and unchangeable condition that a railroad will be constructed within a very reasonable time. Whether the route between Coos Bay and Roseburg is to be used at once or not, this fact remains, that unless the people do something of the kind proposed and do it soon their "State Aided" road and any railroad at all will be at the complete mercy of those who claim that Coos Bay and Southern and Central Oregon are their exclusive territory.

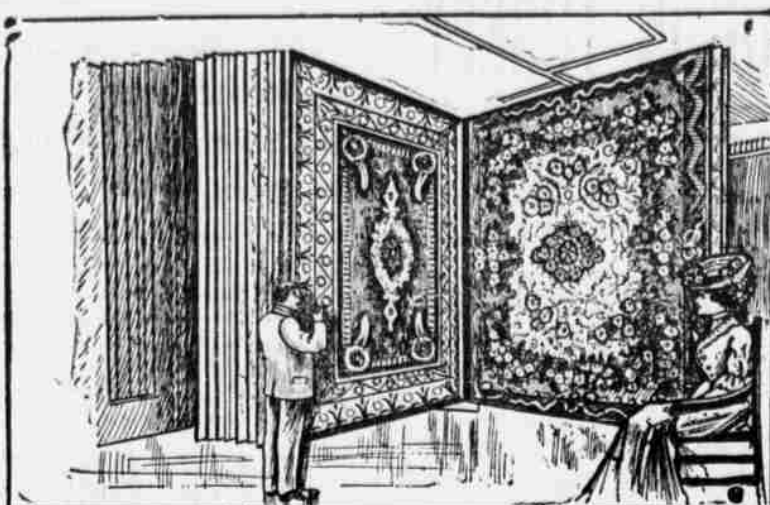

## MRS. FERREY AND PARTY RETURN FROM THE EAST

Reach Coos Bay After Five Months Visit in Eastern Cities and Old Home in Maryland.
