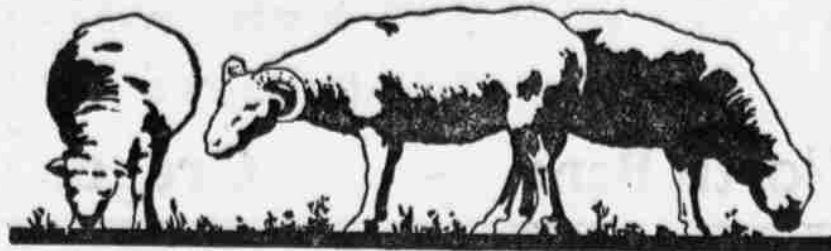

broke out yesterday in the slashings  
on Pony Inlet where the Smith  
Powers Logging Company had re-  
cently cut over. It caused a heavy  
smoke and the flames were visible  
for quite a distance, causing some  
misgiving. No particular damage  
was done.

Libby School to Close.—A very  
successful term of school at Libby  
will close with an entertainment  
next Friday evening. The principal,  
Mrs. Thompson, will go at once to  
North Inlet to begin school there.  
The assistant, Mrs. Eddy, will re-  
main in Libby and conduct a private  
or tuition school.

the weather being glorious for out-  
ings. South Coos River was sought

Burch families, L. D. Pettyjohn and

Work Night Shift.—Capt. Peters  
of the dredge Oregon, announced to-  
day that a night shift will be put  
to work on the dredge tomorrow  
night probably in order that the re-  
mainder of the triangle south of  
Mill Slough south, may be filled by  
May 1, the date the dredge has to  
start on the government project.

Canvass Vote.—The county com-  
missioners are holding a special ses-  
sion at Coquille today to canvass the  
returns of the special port election  
in the Coos Bay drainage basin a  
week ago when the port commission  
question was submitted to the  
voters. According to the returns  
made to County Clerk Watson, the  
total vote in favor of the proposi-  
tion was 992 and 221 against.
