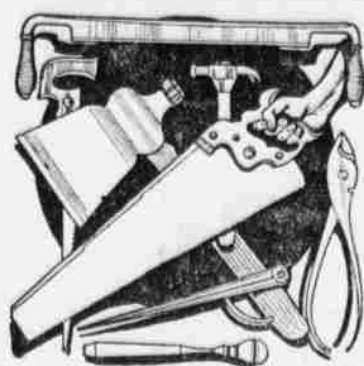

**Will Improve Property.**—Dr. Geo. W. Leslie is figuring on improving his residence property in West Marshfield, it being his plan to remodel and enlarge the present structure.

**Nann Smith In.**—The Nann Smith arrived from Bay Point last evening, Captain Olson having made the round trip from here in five days. General Superintendent Meehan who has been spending some time at Bay Point planned to come up this time, but had to postpone his trip a week.

**Barber's Record.**—According to a "novel" printed in the Roseburg News, Captain L. B. Knauss of that town, formerly a Drain barber, is the greatest Indian scout that ever

**Send In Petitions.**—A petition signed by over two hundred North Bend business men and voters endorsing the selections of the Marshfield and North Bend Chambers of Commerce for port commissioners has been forwarded Gov. Benson. With a similar petition which he will receive from Marshfield, it is believed that the selections are likely to stand. The opposing petitions will probably be forwarded him at an early date. The decision of Gov. Benson will probably be announced within a week.

**No Quorum of Council.**—Owing to Mayor Straw's absence in California and the fact that President of the council A. J. Savage is doing jury duty at Coquille it is not likely that the three remaining members of the Marshfield town board can do any business tonight. A number of matters were to have come up but action on them will have to be postponed a week.

**Improve Mail Service.**—C. J. Mills, general manager of the Coos Bay-Roseburg and Eastern Railway, is arranging to restore the double train service daily between Coos Bay and Myrtle Point that proved such a convenience last summer to Coos Bay people and residents of the Coquille Valley. The service was taken off last fall but then Mr. Mills stated that it would be restored the coming summer. The new schedule which will go into effect May 1 provides passenger service twice a day except Sunday, between Myrtle Point

and intermediate stations and Coos Bay.

**Weds In Spokane.**—Mrs. I. S. Kaufman has received an announcement of the marriage of her nephew, Leland L. Deffenbaugh, and Miss Nellie Allen which was solemnized at the young couple's future home, which had been prepared in advance, last Wednesday. After a short honeymoon trip, they will be at home in Spokane. Mr. Deffenbaugh spent nearly a year on Coos Bay and was very prominent in the younger set here. Hosts of Coos Bay friends will unite in wishing he and his bride a long and happy future.
