Establish New Buoy.—The Light-house Tender Heather is expected here shortly to establish a new whistling buoy off the mouth of the Coquille river.

Taken to Hospital.—Alex Erkhart, the pioneer of Empire City and recently a resident of Prosper, was taken to the state hospital for the insane at Salem today by two attendants.

Bowron Takes Charge.—Frank Bowron has leased the Ten Mile Creamery for a period of five years with an option to buy, and plans to start it soon. He is also figuring on buying the launch, North Star, and the Ten Mile stage line and on starting a store at Lakeside.

Road Nearly Done.—The logging road which the Smith-Powers Logging Company is constructing on Isthmus Inlet, will probably be completed this week. The road will be gradually extended eastward as the timber is cut away, eventually

reaching to the C. A. Smith holdings in Douglas county.

Had Long Trip.—The schooner Annie E. Smale which was built in Marshfield in 1903, recently reached Port Townsend, Wash., from Hongkong after being out ninety five days, one of the longest trips of recent years.

North Bend Couple to Wed.—Friends of the contracting parties have been apprised of the coming marriage of Edward Landenburg and Miss Marion Imhoff of North Bend. Miss Imhoff is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Imhoff and is one of the most popular young women in North Bend.

Lumber Shipments.—The Timberman gives the following data on the Coos county lumber shipments for March: "Bandon, four cargoes, 1,012,945; North Bend, five cargoes, 3,312,045; Coquille mill, one cargo, via Coos Bay, 440,000; Prosper mill, four cargoes 926,310; C. A. Smith mill, Marshfield, seven cargoes, 6,699,090."

Move Excelsior Factory.—Arrangements are being made by Fred Nelson and the other owners of the Excelsior factory on North Front street to move it to South Inlet, Mr. Nelson having recently purchased a site there for it. The reason for the removal is that it can be conducted more cheaply, being nearer the spruce timber.

Sluslaw Port Plan.—D. M. Kemp who came down today on the tug Rosco from Florence, says that intense interest is being taken there in the proposed Port of the Sluslaw. This is similar to the Port of Coos Bay which was recently organized here. A special election will be held May 25 to submit the matter to the voters there and it is practically certain that it will carry.

Reception Friday Night.—Plans were completed today for the public farewell reception which will be given by the Catholic Ladies Thursday night at the A. H. Powers home. The reception will also be sort of a welcome to the Rev. Father J. Moran who succeeds Father Donnelly as pastor of the Catholic church here. It is a non-sectarian event and all are invited to be present.
