

EUGENE TO COOS BAY

Daily Register Makes Important Suggestion That Is Worthy of Investigation.

The Port Commission victory seems to have aroused all Oregon to the fact that Coos Bay is peopled with a live energetic, progressive people. Eugene, Oregon, which is one of the liveliest of live wires in Oregon has begun to sit up and take notice of this section. A Eugene paper complimented Coos Bay the other day on the result of the election and now comes the Eugene Daily Register and in a leading editorial advocates a railway from Eugene to Coos Bay. The article in question indicates that much thought was given the matter and the proposition is one that is worthy of further investigation. The Times suggests that the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce take up the matter promptly and communicate with the Eugene boosters. Here is what the Register says:

Eugene to Coos Bay.
"Coos Bay country, one of the richest sections of Oregon with its deep water harbor has been seeking for years for railroad connections that will put it in touch with the other coast sections and with the east. Futile efforts have so far been made to get a line into that country from Roseburg or from Drain connecting with the Southern Pacific but, owing to the expense of construction due to the amount of tunneling that would have to be done the Harriman interests have turned the project down.

"What seems to us as a more feasible plan would be to build from Eugene to Coos Bay. This can be done at less cost than from either Roseburg or Drain. A natural route lies to the south and west from this city, the grade would be easy and free from tunnels. It would also

connect Coos Bay with the Natron cut-off which will also connect with a direct line to the east through Eastern Oregon and give Coos country a more direct route to eastern markets than it could secure by any other connections.

"This is a matter that should be taken up jointly by Eugene and Coos Bay points. A branch line could be built from a point near Crow on out to the Siuslaw and put western Lane and southwestern Oregon in railroad touch with the world.

MERCHANTS WILL DO AWAY WITH AD GRAFTS

Eugene, Oregon, Business Men Propose to Patronize Only Legitimate Advertising Propositions.

EUGENE April 27.—At the last meeting of the Eugene Merchants' Protective Association it was decided to cut out all advertising grafts and to patronize legitimate newspapers only.

This method has been discussed from time to time by the members of the association and on account of the grafts being so numerous at this time it was finally decided to take action and as a result it was voted almost unanimously to do away with that class of advertising altogether.

The class of advertising that is to be boycotted by the merchants is such as wall hangers, programs, cook books and a number of school publications. The county newspapers and perhaps one or two of the University papers will be endorsed by the association and all other publications will be cut off the advertising list of the members of the association.
