Gets New Launch.—George Goodrum is having a ten-horse power motor boat of the Racine model built for him. It will be completed next week.

Gets New Boat.—Roy Lawhorn this week launched his new twenty-foot launch. He has her equipped with a three-horse power engine and on the trial trip struck a gait of seven miles.

Model Delivery Auto.—Joe Schilling of the Coos Bay Bakery, has equipped auto with a water tight canvas box, enabling him to use the machine for rapid delivery regarding of how it may rain.

Judgment Set Aside.—The judgment against Attorney Watkins for an assault and battery upon Attorney Minot, obtained in the Recorder's Court about a year ago, has been set aside by Judge Coke for irregularities and the action dismissed.

Wires Down.—The Western Union Telegraph Company's wires went down this afternoon and in consequence The Times was able to secure only a partial Associated Press report. Manager Schetter says he hopes to have the "shoe-string" working by tomorrow.

Is Land Commissioner.—Judge Wolverton of the United States court, has announced the appointment of Attorney C. V. Selby as United States land commissioner for this district. Mr. Selby succeeds L. A. Liljeqvist who moved to Coquille and resigned, effective May 1.

L. J. Simpson Subpoenaed.—L. J. Simpson of North Bend has been subpoenaed as a witness in the action of the government to dissolve the merger of the Union Pacific and Southern Pacific lines. He, with Wm. Grimes and Jas. H. Flanagan of Marshfield, are to testify at the hearing in Portland next week.

Build New Home.—The Nelson Iron Works will shortly begin the erection of a new home, the building to be located on the west side of North Front street and just opposite where the firm is now located. The new building will be designated especially for machine shops and will be one of the most completely equipped plants in Southern Oregon.

Undergoes Operation.—Phillip Lee, the young son of Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Lee who was injured in the bicycle collision with Carl Lattin a few weeks ago, today underwent a trepanning operation. The boy's skull was fractured but it was hoped that it would not be necessary to operate on him. He is in a critical condition. Dr. Houseworth had charge of the operation.

Want Ad Does Business.—J. H. Zabriskie while in Marshfield this week lost a Morocco-covered price book of the Hercules Engine Company. He had to leave for Frisco the day he lost it but had a lost ad inserted in The Times and yesterday the book was returned to the Blanco for him and will be forwarded to him. This is merely one of the many instances in the last few days that a want ad in The Times has brought quick results.

Reception Success.—The reception by the Catholic Ladies at the A. H. Powers home last night as a farewell to the Rev. Father Donnelly and a welcome to the Rev. Father J. M. Moran was a decided success, over one hundred being in attendance. Father Donnelly was presented with a purse by the men of the congregation as a token of their esteem. Former Ball Player Dead.—Word has been received here of the death of Oscar W. Westberg at Alameda, Cal., of consumption. Westberg several years ago played with Ban-

don when the City-by-the-Sea had the fast aggregation, "Spider" Baum being their pitcher. Later Westberg made the Boston Nationals and was regarded as one of the fastest ball players in the country. News of his death will be received with great regret by the old fans here as Westberg was very popular.

Go to Curry County.—A party of nineteen homeseekers passed through here last night en route to Curry county where they will look over the offerings of the Port Orford Land and Orchard Company. The latter syndicate has secured a large tract near Denmark, Curry county, and have divided it into small ranches which they are selling as fruit ranches.

To Deliver Oil.—F. S. Dow, agent of the Standard Oil Company, is arranging for the free delivery gasoline to local consumers on the Bay. Owing to the large number of motor boats owned here and the increasing number of automobiles, the free delivery by wagon will be a decided advantage to the consumers and will probably result in increased sales by the company. The plan which Mr. Dow proposes is similar to the tank wagon delivery system in vogue in most cities. The free delivery will probably be extended in time to Ferndale and North Bend.

New Game Laws.—Deputy Game Warden, Cal. Wright expects to receive a copy of the New Oregon game laws within a few days. He has been apprised that all fishermen must take out a license by about May 20, that is everyone fishing with a rod and line. For non-residents of the state the license is \$5 and for residents \$1. Mr. Wright says that he also is sure that the new law prohibits shooting ducks from any kind of a boat in this section. Many claim that it doesn't but Mr. Wright contends otherwise.
