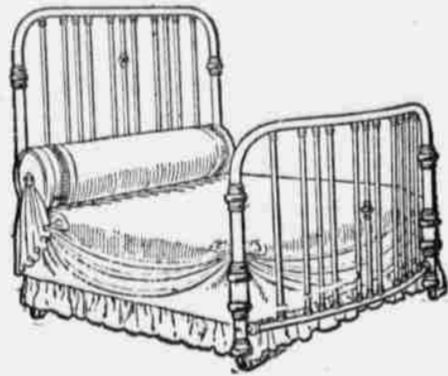

NEWS OF COQUILLE.

Events at County Seat As Told By The Herald.
Z. T. Siglin of the Isthmus, who attended court at this city last Friday, informed us that he will fire a nice kiln of brick this week.

District Attorney Geo. M. Brown did not attend this term of circuit court, but left the duties of that office to be looked after by his deputy, L. A. Liljeqvist.

Glenn Barker of Fairview, was in town Saturday having driven over the Bullock mountain. He tells us that the road is rough, he being the first over the road this spring.

Sam Nass of Astoria, manager of the Prosper salmon cannery, was here the last of the week looking after his interests. He returned to the Bay Monday on his way home.

Miss Lillian Ullmann, a cousin of Mrs. J. C. Moomaw, arrived here Monday from McMinnville, and is enjoying a visit with Mrs. Moomaw and family. She expects to remain some time. They took a trip to Bandon yesterday for a little outing.

The ocean-going gasoline boat, the Gazelle, was here last week for the goods, etc., of J. R. Miller to take them to Rogue river, but Mr. Miller was of the opinion that she was too small a craft and would not send his goods by her.

The United States Dredging Company of San Francisco, was the successful bidder for the ditching of the Fat Elk drainage district, and will proceed at once to get ready for the work. A scow will have to be built for the dredger and some other preparations made before operations will be begun.

Julius Larsen of Marshfield, spent two or three days in this city last week with his son, Hermann Larsen, who is operating their dredge in the Beaver Slough drainage district. This work is proving highly satisfactory. The waters leave these low lands readily when given an opportunity, and this vast body of land will soon be susceptible of cultivation. There is no enterprise to be established in the valley of greater importance than the bringing under cultivation of the rich bottom lands now in willows.

WANT DREDGE OREGON.

Mayor Gallier of Bandon Appeals to Senator Chamberlain.
The Bandon Recorder says: "Mayor Steve Gallier wrote a letter recently to Senator Chamberlain asking that gentleman to assist in getting the dredge Oregon over to the Coquille river to dredge out some of the shoals, and Mr. Chamberlain has promised to do what he could in this as well as other improvements for the Coquille river, although he said there would probably nothing come up at this special session in regard to river and harbor improvements, but that he is laying the foundation for a large amount of work at the next session and hopes to attain some favorable results."

BASEBALL IN COQUILLE.

COQUILLE, Ore., May 1.—A baseball meeting will be held in Coquille Sunday for the purpose of organizing a club here. Those at the head of the movement announce that they are confident that an organization can be effected and that we will have baseball in Coos county the coming season.

News of Upper Valley As Told By The Enterprise.

MYRTLE POINT BOND ISSUE.

Morris Bros. of Portland, Get the Waterworks Bonds.

The Myrtle Point Enterprise says: "At the meeting of the city council Wednesday night to open bids on the new issue of waterworks bonds, the bid of Morris Brothers of Portland, was accepted. Their bid for the \$22,000 five-per cent bonds was \$21,250. In connection they offer to pay the cost of printing the bonds and the necessary attorney's fees in connection with their issuance. The previous issue of bonds was made at a cost of about \$1,000 for these items, so that while the bid on its face does not seem to offer a premium, considered that the cost of printing and attorney's fees will approximate \$1,000, the city will get a premium of about \$250. Several bids were presented, but that of the Morris Brothers was considered the best of the lot and was accordingly accepted."
