Notice is hereby given that sealed bids for special improvements in Road District No. 6, Coos County, Oregon, will be received by the County Clerk of Coos County, Oregon up to 10 o'clock A. M., Thursday the 6th day of May, 1909, as follows, to-wit:

Commencing at one mile stake on west fork road and running in a westerly direction, widening and grading of road according to plans and specifications; also beginning at quarter mile from mile stake No. 4 or two hundred feet from the Southwest corner of Section 8; then extending Northeast about four miles to Douglas county line.

Bids will be received for the two improvements separately. Successful bidder to extend the road as far as special fund for that purpose may be available. CURRY COUNTY DEATHS.

Well-Known Pioneers Pass Away There.

GOLD BEACH, Ore., April 30.—Word has been received here of the deaths of Joe McVay, an old pioneer, and Nathaniel Huntley was buried at Gold Beach. He was a rancher, who came here in early times. He leaves children who are residents here and grandchildren. Joe McVay died at Pistol River Sunday, April 18. He was born in Kentucky in 1831, and came to Coos County in 1853. In '55 and '56 he was a member of Company B, of the Oregon Mounted Volunteers, and fought through the Indian wars of those years at the mouth of Rogue River. At their close he went up north into the mining regions for a brief period but returned and settled at Smith River, Cal., where he engaged in the mercantile business. Five years ago he took up a good homestead on Pistol River, on which he made proof only a few weeks ago, and where his death occurred last Sunday, after an illness of but a few hours. His wife, who was Elizabeth Bosley, has been dead many years.
