COOS BAY AND BOISE LINE

(Continued from page 1.)

Commerce, found it was absolutely necessary to get the project down to a definite basis where Coos Bay would have something definite to offer capitalists if it was hoped to secure them to build it or to get the project in such shape that the people themselves can go ahead with it if the former are too slow. In order to do this, it was found that Coos Bay must have a survey made of the proposed route, showing the grades and curvatures that can be obtained, must secure the right of way and the terminals and must have definite data on the probable business. In order to secure these, he said it had been decided to organize a small holding company, the stock of which would be placed in escrow by the Chambers of Commerce, to prevent anyone getting control of the project and thwarting the plans of the projectors. To do this, it had been decided to issue survey certificates to subscribers to the fund for the preliminary work. These certificates will be in various denominations and will bear six per cent interest. They will be sort of a first mortgage on the securities that the company may obtain, such as survey, right of way, etc. Besides the interest, five per cent of all bonuses given the company is to be divided among the holders of these certificates, the latter being an inducement and a rightful reward to the men who do the pioneering. Mr. Diers said that F. A. Haines who, for twenty-seven years, had been employed as locating engineer for the Northwestern Railway in the construction of its extensions west of the Mississippi river, was on Coos Bay and had agreed to take charge of the survey for the company. The securing of such an able man, Mr. Diers considered a remarkable opportunity for the Bay. In regards to the capitalization, Mr. Diers said that it had been fixed at \$25,000 because it was decided that the work should be done conservatively. He said that the work of securing the survey, terminals and options on right of way would cost somewhere between \$8,000 and \$15,000, probably. He said that provision had been made for nine directors so that other cities or communities who join in the work might be allowed representations on the board in charge and see the money is properly expended.

Wants United Support.

Wm. Grimes spoke of the necessity of united action on the part of the citizens of Coos Bay in order that the work might be successfully accomplished. He said that the committee had received assurance from all sides that this would be given but besides the moral support, the committee would like to have some financial assistance from every one who can afford it, even though it be but \$5. He said that Coos Bay had shown its ability to get together by its action on the port proposition, in the building of the Chandler hotel and other progressive movements. He said that people as far away as Bandon had promised to aid the project. Furthermore, he said the committee had received letters from prominent financiers and railroad men pledging favorable consideration of the project if Coos Bay would go ahead and initiate the movement. He said that investors in this class of security dread the "hold up" that citizens of some communities often impose on railroads attempting to enter them and consequently nearly everyone had suggested that one of the important things for Coos Bay to do was to get the right of way or terminals or options on them and have something definite to discuss or consider. Going back to the necessity of unanimity, Mr. Grimes said that he wished that the citizens of Marshfield would get together and have the city council settle its petty difficulties and get down to business and have the streets improved as every property owner wishes. He said that he was in favor of holding weekly meetings of citizens at the Chamber of Commerce until this was effected. This was later carried out by the meeting adopting a motion that weekly meetings should be held to further discuss and aid the railroad project and to endeavor to settle the difficulties in the city council.

Judge Peck of Oklahoma, a recent arrival on the Bay, said that everyone knows that Coos Bay had the



making of a great city but almost everyone realizes that a metropolis can't be obtained without a railroad. He said that Coos Bay has three great natural resources, any one of which will support a great city—namely a harbor and location that will make it a great shipping and distributing point, great coal fields and great timber and lumber resources. He approved of the plan of the people to go ahead and get their own railroad and said it could be accomplished if the people just got together and kept together. As a former fellow citizen of Wm. Grimes in Oklahoma, he said that he wished to tell the people of Coos Bay that they could not have a better man to assist them, according to the opinion of men who had known Mr. Grimes for years at his old home.
F. S. Dow approved of the plan outlined and said that San Diego was today getting a railroad as a result of a movement started there, similar to the one Coos Bay has inaugurated.
Claude Nasburg said that he was highly in favor of the plan and
