LITTLE TALKS ABOUT TOWN

A GRIST OF COOS BAY GOS-SIP GATHERED HERE AND THERE ABOUT THINGS OF PASSING INTEREST.

"There were in existence on December 31, 6,889 banks, with authorized capital, \$993,020,275," remarked a Marshfield banker today, "and circulation outstanding How Much secured by bonds, Have You? \$628,786,205. The total amount of national bank circulation outstanding is \$677,088,165, of which \$48,281,960 is covered by lawful money of a like amount deposited with the treasurer of the United States on account of liquidation and insolvent national banks and associations who have reduced their circulation."

"Coos Bay people do not seem to be as large consumers of ice-cream as easterners," remarked a New York traveling man at the Chandler today.

"With the arrival of ice-cream the first warm days the Eaters. gigantic ice-cream industry of New York City blossoms forth. New York eats something like 200,000 gallons of ice-cream every hot summer day, which at the average price of \$1 a gallon, gives a literally cool \$200,000 as the amount of money spent for this frigid pabulum during a single period of twenty-four hours. One firm, employing 400 men and 100 girls, turns out 4,000 gallons a day, while the great hotels and restaurants make their own creams and there are no end of small private manufacturers, many of which supply the cheap "hokey-pokey" which is composed of condensed milk, water and flavoring. There are 150 different varieties of ice-cream, but 40 per cent of the ordinary sales are plain vanilla, and even in the high-class resorts, only four or five kinds are much called for. And the ice-cream isn't all eaten in New York. Several houses ship all over the Eastern states and to Cuba, while steamers are provided with supplies sufficient to last in good condition on voyages to Europe and back and even to Australia and the Orient."

"Many persons are under the impression that a letter once mailed is no longer the property of the sender, but belongs to the person to whom it is addressed," remarked one of Uncle Sam's Secret Service Postal inspectors. "This is an error. Under the postal regulations of the United States and the rulings of the highest courts in the land, a letter does not belong to the addressee until it is delivered to him."

"The writer has a right to reclaim and regain possession of it, provided he can Of a Letter. prove to the satisfaction of the postmaster at the office from which it was sent, that he was the writer of it."

"Even after the letter has arrived at the office which is its destination, and before it has been delivered to the addressee, it may be recalled by the writer by telegraph through the mailing office."

"The regulations of the Postoffice Department require, of course, that utmost care shall be taken by the postmaster at the office of mailing to ascertain that the person who desires to withdraw the letter is really the one who is entitled to do so, and the postmaster is responsible for his error if he delivers the letter to an imposter or to an unauthorized person."

"The vital principle in our political system lies at the bottom of this matter. In this country the state is the servant or agent of the citizen, not his master. It remains merely his agent throughout the transmission of a letter. The state may prescribe regulations under which its servants may carry a message for the citizen; but it cannot shirk its responsibility to him."
