Finish Monday.—Captain Peters of the dredge Oregon stated today that the fill on the west side of Broadway and south of Anderson avenue will be finished Monday. The dredge will begin the Central avenue fill Tuesday.

Child Better.—The two-year-old child of Mr. and Mrs. Cole of Coal Bank Inlet who was dangerously ill as a result of rhododendron poisoning is reported improved today. The little one is practically out of danger now.

Put Up Tower.—Otto Schetter is having the storm signal tower which the United States Weather Bureau ordered established here put up on Knob Hill near the wireless station. The high wind has delayed the work on it somewhat.

Work Delayed.—The planking of South Broadway is being delayed by the inability of the C. A. Smith Lumber Company to furnish the lumber required. It is expected that

the lumber will be cut early next week so that the improvement can be completed within the next ten days. The property owners are getting irate over the long delay.

Invents Tongs.—W. W. Endicott has applied for a patent for a pair of blacksmith tongs invented by him. One jaw of the tongs is set on a pivot that allows it to adjust itself to a piece of iron of any angle which it will hold firmly while being worked. Blacksmiths have great trouble in holding an angular piece of iron with the ordinary tongs while it is being hammered into shape and this invention of Mr. Endicott's is calculated to overcome that difficulty. Roseburg View.—Coos Bay's railroad movement is certainly getting attention through the newspapers of the state. That region has a volume of resources too great to be kept bottled up much longer. One important lesson the people of the Bay have learned, and that is that they can expect nothing from Mr. Harriman in the way of railway communication. He may be expected to "get busy," however, as soon as they start a line of their own, as is now being agitated.—Roseburg Review.

Dredge Breaks Down.—The Simpson dredge which is being used in improving Catching Inlet to Sumner, broke down Wednesday and has delayed the work some. The dredge has been doing excellent work and will soon complete a good channel to Sumner. This week, the county court appropriated \$1,840 for the work. The residents of Sumner raised this amount by subscription and the commissioners agreed with Captain Harris, who has charge of the project, to give dollar for dollar. The citizens expect to raise several hundred dollars more and the county court will give them a like sum.
