nounced that the Catholic parsonage
near St. Monica's church will be re-
fitted as a home for the new pastor,
the Rev. Father J. Moran. The regu-
lar parsonage has been vacant for
some time, the Rev. Father E. Don-
nelly having made his home with his
sister, Mrs. Early in West Marsh-
field.

Many On Picnics.—Despite the
threatening weather yesterday,
there was a great exodus from
Marshfield to the inlets and beach.
The steamer Alert took a party of
forty or more, mostly Oklahomans,
up South Coos River while the Flyer
took a large number to Charleston.
It was a trifle cool and damp but
all report a good time.

Early potatoes, tomatoes,
beans, and corn were nipped. How-

**A GRIST OF COOS BAY GOS-
SIP GATHERED HERE AND
THERE ABOUT THINGS OF
PASSING INTEREST.**

"Talk about the anti-lean cure,
Coos Bay climate is the greatest I
ever encountered," remarked Robert
O. Graves, an attorney
Coos Bay who recently came to
Weather. Marshfield from In-
diana. "I have been
here a trifle over three weeks and
have gained twelve pounds in that
time. Last week, I gained eight
pounds. I am eating and sleeping
as I used to during my athletic days
in college."

"Talk about the enjoyment of an
outing, you don't know one if you
haven't spent a few days fishing at
Ten Mile," remarked
J. Albert Matson on
Ten Mile. His return from the
lakes a few days ago
with his wife. "I never had finer
fishing or a more enjoyable time in
my life and I hated to break away.
Miss Johnson who accompanied Mrs.
Matson and I had never caught a
fish but we had not been out long
until she hooked some fine trout and
you never saw a more delighted
young woman."

"Before I came to Oregon from
California, I used to hear that it was
cold and wet all the time, but I
want to tell you I
never saw so much
dust in all my years in
Sacramento as I en-
countered in Portland Saturday," re-
marked Lee Brown, former purser

dust bother me, but it was hot. I

**Eureka-Coos Bay-Portland Boat Line
Planned.**

The Eureka Herald says: "For
the last month it has been rumored
along the Eureka waterfront that
the California-Oregon Coast Steam-
ship Company, or the old Gray
Steamship Company, Gray and Holt,
is contemplating the establishment
of a two-steamer line between this
city and Portland."

"It has not been long since a num-
ber of agents of the steamship com-
pany were in Eureka and Humboldt
county endeavoring to sell stock in
a proposed new steamer to be built
especially for this run, or to secure
pledges to take stock to an amount
that would seem to justify the
steamship company in going ahead
with the plans for the new line."

"How successful these agents
were is not known, but the proposi-
tion has been seen in print several
times since their departure, so that
it would appear the company is still
considering the matter."
