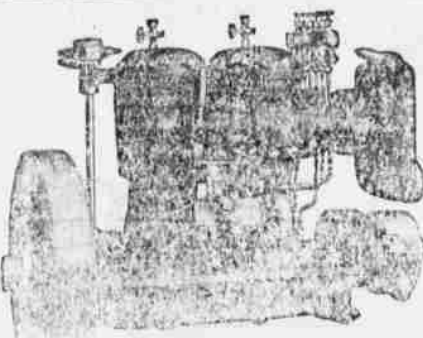

yesterday. She will load with lum-
ber from the Johnson mill at the
Railroad docks.

Sell Schooner.—It is announced
that the Simpson Lumber Company
has sold the schooner Repeat which
was built at North Bend in 1897 to
Captain McKenna of Puget Sound,
who will convert it into a gasoline
whaler.

Body Is Cremated.—The body of
Dr. O. E. Smith, the former Coos
Bay dentist who died in Portland a
few weeks ago, was taken from his
home in Eugene where the funeral
was held to Portland where it was
cremated and the ashes placed in an
urn.

Boat Club Meeting.—The recent-
ly organized Coos Bay Motor Boat
Club will hold its first meeting in
Marshfield at the Chamber of Com-
merce rooms tonight at 8 o'clock.
Hereafter this club will alternate its
meetings between North Bend and
Marshfield.

Build On Rogue River.—It is
stated that Anderson and Chase who

will run a fishery on Rogue River
this summer will erect a cold stor-
age plant there next season. This
year they will ship their catch to the
Coos Bay Cold Storage plant in
gasoline launches.

Breaks Burial Record.—John
Longstaff, sexton at the I. O. O. F.
cemetery, reports fourteen burials
during the month of April, the lar-
gest number during any one month
in its history. Four of the deaths
were due to drowning, one was ac-
cidental, one a suicide and the others
due to natural causes.

LITTLE TALKS

ABOUT TOWN

A GRIST OF COOS BAY GOS-
SIP GATHERED HERE AND
THERE ABOUT THINGS OF
PASSING INTEREST.

"During thirty years of asbestos
production, Canada, which leads the
world in the output of this mineral,
has produced \$20,-
000,000 worth," said
Asbestos a hardware salesman
Comes From. with a head for fig-
ures today. "In 1878
the output was 50 tons, while in
1908 it was 65,534 tons, worth \$2,-
547,507. The product has been
hitherto manufactured in the United
States and Europe, but large works
for the making of asbestos articles
are being installed in Canada."

Speaking about handwriting that
is hard to read, an old timer who
was one of the first men employed
by R. E. Graham, who

to continue to use it?" Mr. Graham
put on his glasses, looked the paper

this is not a pass. It is a receipt I
gave the fellow for a load of wood
about a year ago."

"Did you know that in Mexico City
a theatre building is under construc-
tion that will cost \$7,000,000," re-

on Coos Bay. "They have worked on
it three years and have got up about
to the top of the first story. There
is a four-story hardware store in
Mexico City that contains several
acres of floor space, and the last
inventory showed \$1,500,000 of
hardware for sale in the building.
It takes several hours to go through
and see all the articles for sale. It
monopolizes all the business for the
whole city of several hundred thou-
sand people and the country tribu-
tary to the city. The American quar-
ter in the southern part of the city
contains some very fine residences,
including one, belonging to a rail-
road man, that cost \$80,000. The
Spaniards are a fine looking people,
but are seen very little, and then
only in the park or riding in their
carriages. The most of the people
a traveler sees are peons part Indian,
and are inferior looking."
