AFTER AN ARDUOUS struggle of years, The Pendleton Tribune, the only morning paper in Pendleton, with a population of ten thousand, has given up the ghost and ceased publication after sinking a great many thousands of dollars. This leaves Pendleton with only one daily paper, the evening East Oregonian. The East Oregonian is a good newspaper, wide-awake and enterprising and the business men of Pendleton evidently agreed that one good newspaper was better than two poor ones and gave their patronage to the East Oregonian. Seymour Bell's, henchmen who were trying to interest Marshfield business men in putting up money for another daily in Marshfield might get some valuable information as to what it costs to run a daily newspaper by consulting the publishers of the Pendleton Morning Tribune and Pendleton is a city of ten thousand people, too.

NEWSPAPER ADVERTISING.

A well-known magazine published for retail dealers has the following remarks to make about newspaper advertising. If a member of your family died, would you print the resolutions on a bill board? If your wife entertained, would you send an account of it to the theater program man? If you were going to enlarge your business would you advertise it in a hotel register? If you were going to have a wedding in your family would you get out a handbill? You would send such items to a newspaper, wouldn't you? Then why don't you put your advertisements in a newspaper? Every man who uses the billboard is adding to nature faking. Every dollar spent in a theatre program, in a register, in a directory, or in a handbill, is a legitimate dollar taken away from the newspapers of your town. The newspapers build your town; why not help build up the newspapers? There is no better advertisement in the world for a town than a good newspaper. A newspaper is the barometer of the town's industry. Show us a good newspaper full of advertising and we will show you a good town, full of live, prosperous merchants. Billboards are an eyesore; handbills are a nuisance; theatre programs are worthless; hotel registers, from an advertising standpoint, are ridiculous. Newspapers are town builders, town advertisers, fortune makers, news disseminators, sermon deliverers, prosperity forecasters—they are a necessity, not a luxury. Without them we would retrograde to the medieval days. Don't patronize them from a charitable or sentimental standpoint—patronize them because they deliver the goods—that is, they are the right kind. Cut out the foolishness and work for the upbuilding of your town.
