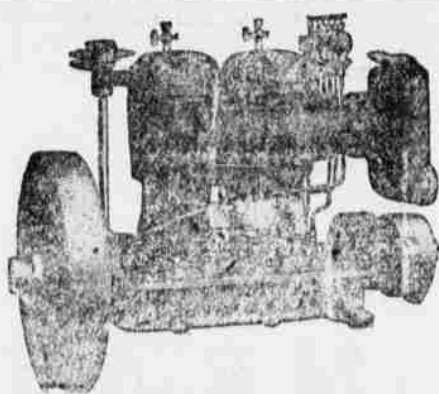

Bee Sails.—The steam schooner Bee completed taking on her cargo at the C. A. Smith mill and sailed for San Francisco last night.

Preuss Improves.—John Preuss continues to improve at the German hospital in San Francisco where he recently underwent an operation. He is able to sit up part of the time now.

Improves Lot.—W. T. Merchant is having his lot on North Broadway, terraced and sodded. It will be made one of the prettiest residence lots in the city, Mr. Merchant having one of the finest views from his residence that is obtainable.
