While the wholesale price is around 21 cents, candling, packing and storing bring the total up to 25 cents. A margin of 10 cents per dozen would send the price to 35 cents and the egg packers of course will exact as much more as they can get. Only by working faithfully at her job all spring, summer and fall, will the American biddy be able to keep the price of eggs from going as high relatively as the price of butter, bread and potatoes. Postmaster W. B. Curtis has just been notified that the postoffice department at Washington is preparing a new postage stamp of special design, which will be ready for sale on June 1, to commemorate the development of the Alaska-Yukon Pacific territory. appears a portrait of William H. Seward, who as secretary of state, conducted the negotiations for the purchase of Alaska from Russia. The name "William H. Seward," appears under the portrait. On either side is an ellipse containing the Arabic numeral 2 with laurel branches as a background.
