NEWS OF COQUILLE.

County Seat Events As Told By The Sentinel.

Miss Ray Collier left yesterday for Marshfield en route to Albany to attend the grand lodge of the Rebekas which meets at that place the 18th of this month.

D. H. Dollar and wife, came up from Marshfield Saturday and remained in town for a few days while Mr. Dollar was looking after his timber interests in this section.

Mrs. B. F. Gambell arrived this week for an extended visit with her sister, Mrs. G. H. Fesse. Mrs. Gambell comes from Eureka Springs, Arkansas, and comes to Oregon to regain her lost health.

Mrs. Russel Chapman departed Saturday for North Yaluma, Washington. Russ expects to join her there in the course of the next month and they will locate on a fruit ranch there in which he is interested.

Last week Stewart Lyons received two Maxwell runabouts one for Tom Guerin of Myrtle Point, and the other for W. H. Lyons of this city. They are of the same pattern as the one Stewart has had for some time and are nobby cars.

B. L. Cunningham, special government inspector of land claims, was in Coquille for several days the first of the week. His business at this time was the investigation of several locations which the government deems more valuable for other purposes than those which they were located for.

Workmen commenced tearing down the old barn on the Messer lot opposite the Sentinel Wednesday.
