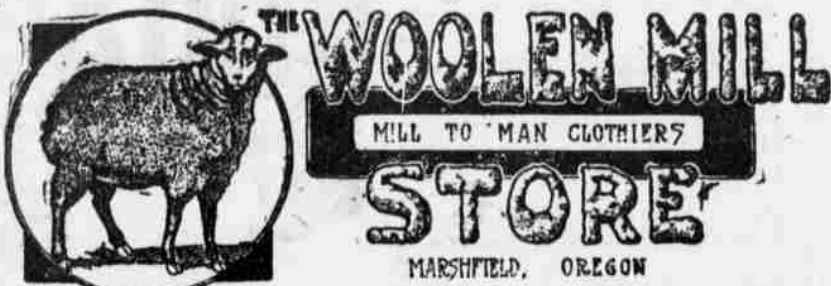

New Home Completed.—The new home of Mr. and Mrs. James Forty in Bay Park, which is one of the best in that suburb, has just been completed by Contractor Gahrke.

Improve Ball Park.—Manager A. F. Burkhardt of the Marshfield ball team, has arranged with Contractor Gehrke to have the grandstand and fence of the old park repaired immediately and put in condition for this season's games.

Is Quite Ill.—Mr. Hayes, father of Mrs. John Snyder, Sr., and a well-known Coos Bay pioneer, has been quite ill at the home of his daughter the past week. He is about ninety years old.

Injures Hand.—Fay Matson was brought down late Saturday from Emmet Pierce's logging camp with a badly injured hand. In working around the machinery, his left hand got caught and was severely crushed.

Move Store.—The Ten-Cent Store on Broadway near the F. S. Dow warehouse has been closed and it is announced that Mr. Witte will move it to Eastside. A S. Taylor who started it left the city rather suddenly a few days ago.

Jumps On Spike.—Homer Mauzey is around on crutches as a result of lighting on a spike when he jumped off the delivery wagon of the Marshfield Laundry the other day. The spike went through the sole of his right shoe and penetrated his foot, leaving a painful wound.

Moves Meat Market.—Henry Holmes of the Coos Bay Meat Company, has leased the building at the corner of Front street and Central avenue, recently vacated by R. H. Noble's City Market, and will occupy it. Mr. Holmes believes the new location will be more convenient for his customers than the old stand on Front street across from the Chamber of Commerce.

More For Firemen.—Chief Tom Nicols yesterday received a check from Capt. Amos Donaldson of Berkeley, Cal., for \$50 for the Marshfield firemen. Capt. Donaldson owns the buildings south of the Sengstacken building which was burned ten days ago and he is loud in his praise of the work the fire department must have done to confine it to the one building.

Put Up Street Names.—The signs with the names of the streets are being put up. As soon as all are placed, the city officials will immediately proceed to compel the placing of numbers on every building. With this completed, the city, will soon be ready for the free mail delivery which it is believed the post-office department will establish here sometime this summer.

Fire This Morning.—The Noble pile-driver caught fire, evidently from a spark from the donkey engine, this morning at the new dock of the Oregon Coal and Navigation Company. It had gained considerable headway when discovered but those from the cold storage plant nearby succeeded in extinguishing it before the fire department reached the scene. The damage was small.

Bell's Is Coming.—Word was received here this morning that Seymour H. Bell would arrive in a day or two from Portland to look after interests on the Bay. Somebody started the report that Mr. Bell was

behind the project of J. H. Somers and others, who have recently secured an electric light, power and railway franchise in Coquille and the franchise on the county road for an interurban. When told about the report this morning, Mr. Somers laughed and said he had also been told that Mr. Knuppenburg was behind it. However, Mr. Somers is getting things in shape and expects to be able to make a detailed announcement of the plans of his people.

Progress Club.—The Progress Club will meet with Mrs. Elmer Todd tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Bishop Scadding Coming.—A Portland paper says: "Bishop Scadding expects to spend much of the Summer with Rev. William Horsfall in visiting the missions in Coos and Curry counties."

Baby Is Scalded.—The two-year-old child of Mr. and Mrs. Hancock of the life-saving station was quite badly scalded by upsetting a pot of hot coffee last evening. Dr. Golden who was called to it says the injuries are not serious, although the burns about the neck and chest are very painful.

Wants Store to Close.—The Marshfield High School boys are trying to get the stores to close from 2 to 5 o'clock next Saturday afternoon to insure a good attendance at the County High School field meet which will be pulled off at the Fairgrounds that day. Already Ekblad and Son, the Coos Bay Cash Store, the Finnish Cooperative Store and a few others have promised to close.
