## WILL BUILD ELECTRIC LINE

J. H. Somers Expects to Have Road In Operation In Two Years.

Editor of Coos Bay Times:

In your last night's issue of The Times there appears an article the head line is as follows: "Bell Coming," and then goes on to state about the franchise I have secured, and connect Mr. Bell's and Mr. Knuppenburg's names with the proposition I am working on. I told your city editor when I could I would give a statement that would be satisfactory to the people. The real facts are as follows: I have never authorized a statement but will say I am working with some of the best people in the country, and we are trying to get a railroad to Coos Bay. There is plenty of room for more than one road and I hope there will be more than one built, but if my plans are successful we will have an electric road in less than twenty-four months, we are not asking the people to give us money to start. After my people have started, if they do, and have invested their own money and demonstrated their sincerity to complete the road in the specified time, then should they have any stock or bonds to offer as an investment the public might do well in buying them, as an investment, but I can assure you that the people will not be asked to subscribe or invest until my parties have at least showed their good intentions by investing their own money first and commencing actual operations. I will positively say that neither Mr. Bell or Mr. Knuppenburg nor the Southern Pacific are connected with my plans or the people I am working with. I will give the names of the real parties at the right time. Hoping this will place me in the right light and that the people will feel I am working for the benefit of the community at large and without a selfish motive, I am very truly yours,
