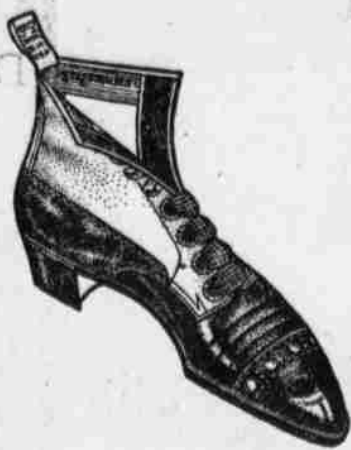

Entertain Friends.—The Marshfield Lodge of the Degree of Honor gave a social at their hall last evening, a few guests being invited besides the members. Mrs. L. White was chairman of the evening. Delicious refreshments were served.

Ready For Field Meet.—Preparations for the Coos county field meet at the Fairgrounds here Friday afternoon have been practically completed. The advance sale of tickets has been large and the event promises to be a most entertaining one.

Reed Gets Place.—Capt. John Reed, formerly of Gardiner and well-known on the Bay, has been appointed assistant superintendent of pilotage of the Port of Portland. He has been in charge of the tug Wallula on the Columbia since leaving Gardiner.

Many Teams Cross.—Since the ferry slip for the Eastside ferry has been completed in Marshfield, a large number of teams are crossing to Eastside and taking the Summer road east. Besides enabling the ferry to handle rigs, it is also able to give quicker service.

Build at Sunset Bay.—Capt. John Swing with his launch, Ranger, has been putting in some moorings on Sunset Bay near L. J. Simpson's summer home, "Shore Acres." The moorings are for barges which are to carry over lumber that will be used there this summer.

Wins Homestead.—Miss Nellie Wasson has received notice from the United States Land Office at Wash-

ington that her claim to a homestead on South Inlet, has been sustained. Her homestead was contested by North Bend parties sometime ago and it was carried up.

John Preuss Better.—Word from San Francisco is that John Preuss who underwent an operation at the German hospital there recently, continues to improve. He is now able to sit up part of the time but it will be quite a while before he will be able to return home.

Curtis Is Better.—Word from W. B. Curtis, who went to St. Martin's Springs, Wash., to recuperate from a long attack of the grip, says that he is improving. At the springs, he met Dr. Prentiss, formerly of Coos Bay, who has been laid up with a severe attack of rheumatism.

Adjust Losses.—Practically all the losses in the recent fire on Broadway have been adjusted, George Goodrum settling his yesterday. Minister Leaves.—Rev. Henry Quickenden of Caldwell, Idaho, who came here to look over the field with a view of becoming pastor of the Marshfield Presbyterian church, left yesterday for his home. A meeting of the Presbyterian congregation will probably be called soon to ascertain whether a call shall be extended to him. It is likely that the call will be extended as he made a very good impression while here.

House is Burned.—Wm. Bowron's ranch house on South Lake was destroyed by fire last week. The place is the home of his two sons, his daughter-in-law and sister-in-law. All of the members of the family were at the barn, about two hundred yards from the house, when the fire was discovered and it had gained such headway that it was impossible to save anything. The loss will be quite heavy, the household effects and family relics being destroyed.

Pumped Up By Dredge.—A number of curios are being pumped by the dredge Oregon from the bottom of the Bay. Yesterday, Jesse Luse found a large bar of iron, evidently dropped by some boat, that had been forced the long distance from where the dredge is working to the Commercial avenue fill. A few days ago, W. H. Noble is reported to have picked up a \$20 gold piece near Fourth and Central avenue that is supposed to have been pumped up by the dredge when it was filling the street there.

SOIL SURVEYS HERE.

Government Experts Coming to Coos County.

WASHINGTON D. C., May 18.—On the urgent recommendation of Representative Hawley, the Secretary of Agriculture has ordered that soil surveys be made in Coos county, Oregon, during the present summer. Soil specialists will be sent to Coos county in about a month, and after arrival, will select the locality in which their work will be done. Their report will be of value largely in helping farmers to determine the best crops to raise, and the best method of cultivation to obtain the best results.

"We are going to start a crusade against the people who insist on calling San Francisco 'Frisco,'" remarked a San Francisco "traveling" man at the Chandler the other day. "There is no good reason for it and it doesn't sound nearly as nice as the proper name. The San Francisco papers will take it up and I think that we can effect a reform in the course of a couple of years that will eliminate the slangy reference to the leading city on the coast."

"We are shipping just as much coal to San Francisco now as we ever have at this season of the year," remarked F. S. Dow, agent of the steamer M. F. Plant. I notice that someone told The Times that the reason for the light shipments was because the fuel trust was giving us the worst end of the bargain. They are dead wrong and evidently don't know what they are talking about. We expect to ship about 600 tons on the M. F. Plant this week."
