Hay Is Lower.—F. S. Dow received advice today that the price of hay declined \$10 per ton in San Francisco owing to heavy receipts of new hay. Mr. Dow says that he believes this is the forerunner of a general decline in hay and grain.

Open New Street.—C. J. Hillstrom is making arrangements to widen the alley through his property in West Marshfield to thirty feet and thus make a new street. The alley runs from Thirteenth to Fourteenth street between Anderson avenue and Central avenue.

Michigan Capitalists Aligned With Smith Company.

The Portland Telegram says: "Fred Kribs, timber king, has just returned from a two weeks' automobile trip through portions of Crook, Grant, Harney, and Malheur counties, with a party of Michigan timber operators who are supposed to be closely identified with the Smith Company at Coos Bay. The principal belts of yellow pine in these counties were looked over, and it is understood that negotiations will soon be conducted for the sale of vast areas of timber in the region visited. It is known that the prospective buyers were immensely pleased with the showing made and are likely to plunge heavily in the Oregon timber market during the next few weeks."

TEST PORT LAW IN HIGH COURT

Commissioners Decide to Have Friendly Action Brought At Once.

At a meeting of the Coos Bay Port Commission in the office of the secretary, Henry Sengstacken, in Marshfield yesterday afternoon, it was decided that the constitutionality of the port law should be tested in a friendly suit before any formal business is taken up under it. This is a precautionary step. The commissioners simply anticipated what would be required if they should attempt to float a bond issue, purchasers requiring that all questions of validity be settled before they will take the bonds. As the commission will have no funds from taxation to defray the expense of any harbor improvement before another year elapses, a project taken up would have to be paid for by the sale of bonds.

By starting the action promptly, it is believed that it can be heard in the circuit court at the June term and then immediately appealed to the Supreme Court and a final decision secured within possibly ninety days.

Another meeting of the commission will be held next Wednesday to make the final preparations for the test suit. The attorney for the port commission will then be selected.

Yesterday, the regular meetings of the commission were fixed for the afternoon of the second Wednesday of each month. However, the commissioners will adjourn each time subject to the call of the president W. P. Evans, so that any extraordinary business can be looked after.

All of the members were in attendance at yesterday's session. Various matters were discussed but no action was taken aside from the decision to have the friendly suit brought to definitely establish the constitutionality of the port law.
