

**Commissioners Decide to Have Friendly Action Brought** 

#### At Once.

At a meeting of the Coos Bay Port Commission in the office of the secretary, Henry Sengstacken, in Marshfield yesterday afternoon," it was decided that the constitutionality of the port law should be tested in a friendly suit before any formal business is taken up under it. This is a precautionary step. The commissioners simply anticipated what would be required if they should attempt to float a bond issue, purdays at the Stephen Rogers ranch chasers requiring that all questions of validity be settled before they will take the bonds. As the commission will have no funds from taxation to defray the expense of any harbor improvement before another year elapses, any project taken up would have to be paid for by the sale of bonds.

> By starting the action promptly, it is believed that it can be heard in the circuit cour' at the June term and then immediately appea.ed to the Supreme Court and a final declsion secured within possibly ninety days.

Another meeting of the commission will be held next Wednesday to make the final preparations for the test suit. The autorney for the port commission will then be selected.




