CHICAGO, May 21.—Patrolman Frank B. Wise, a giant stationed at Fifth avenue and Smithfield street, he city's busiest corner, has to work hard, but admits that his labor is lightened by pleasing incidents. A new trolley car slot at the corner "kicks the shoes from about twenty-five horses which step on it each day, and the slot is just wide enough to catch the heel of a woman's French shoe, so Wise's duty is diversified, says a Pittsburg dispatch to the Tribune.

WILD CAT VS. MAN.

Fierce Battle For Life In Chicken Pen.

MIDDLETOWN, Conn., May 21.—John Simonton, who raises chickens at Deep River, near here, had a desperate battle with a wild cat near his home and narrowly escaped with his life. Simonton had gone to the chicken pen with his dog to look over his poultry, much of which had been stolen of late, and he caught the animal in the act of making off with one of the chickens.

At a signal from his master Simonton's dog jumped at the cat, but the animal turned and struck him a blow with one paw that tore his head open. Simonton seized a club just as the beast sprang for his "acc. He sidestepped and swung at it with the weapon, but he missed his aim and the cat sank its claws into his arm. He shook it off, but it came at him again, and, realizing that his life was in danger, Simonton fought with such desperation that at last got in a blow that broke his club over the head of the cat.

The blow stunned the animal, and with another club Simonton soon despatched it. It is the first specimen of a wild cat seen in this section for years, and is about three feet long and weighs fifty pounds. Simonton will have the skin mounted.

CHINK SEEKS DIVORCE.

BOSTON, May 21.—Chin Lee, an Americanized Chinese, is the first of that nationality to appear in the divorce court of Suffolk county as a libellant. Chin Lee asks for a divorce from his wife, Annie McCarthy Lee, to whom he was married in this city on August 24, 1908, and with whom he had since lived at 23 Tyler street. In his libel Chin Lee says that he has always been faithful to his vows and obligations. He bases his prayer for a legal separation on statutory grounds.
