ODD FELLOWS HOLD MEETING

Annual Session of Grand Encampment Is Held at Albany.

ALBANY, Ore., May 21. — The Grand Encampment of Oregon, I. O. O. F., held its 35th annual session in this city. The Rebekah Assembly of Oregon met in 23rd annual session. Eight hundred delegates were here.

All of the officers of the Grand Encampment elected were present except Grand High Priest R. Robertson; of Roseburg, who died during the past year; and Grand Outside Sentinel J. S. Lawrence of Coquille.

The Rebekah Assembly met in the A. O. U. W. hall and the entire forenoon was consumed in conferring the Grand Assembly degree upon a class of 182 members, by far the largest class ever initiated into the Grand Assembly of Oregon. All of the Grand Assembly officers were present except Grand Outside Guard Mrs. Nellie Bernitt of Marshfield.

John M. Williams of Eugene, was this afternoon elected Grand Patriarch of the Grand Encampment for the ensuing year, and E. J. Seely of Albany the retiring Grand Patriarch, was chosen Grand Representative for a term of two years. E. E. Sharon of Portland, was elected Grand Scribe for the 16th successive time, and W. W. Francis of Albany, county treasurer of Linn county, was chosen Grand Treasurer for a seventh consecutive term.

Other officers of the Grand Encampment were chosen as follows: Grand High Priest, W. R. Cunningham of Canyon City; grand senior warden, L. Wimberly of Roseburg; grand junior warden, O. P. Miller of Portland; grand marshal, G. P. Rickley, of Harrisburg, (re-elected); grand sentinel, C. A. Pogue, of Ontario (re-elected); grand outsider sentinel, Geo. W. Wright, of Albany.

The Assembly spent the afternoon receiving reports of officers. Reports showed 160 lodges of the order in Oregon, five of them being organized in the past year. The gain in membership during the past year was 1060, making the total membership in the state 12,229.

MURDER ENDS ROAD QUARREL

ONE DEAD, ONE WOUNDED AND ONE MISSING AS RESULT OF ROW OVER HIGHWAY NEAR PENDLETON, OREGON.

PENDLETON Ore., May 21.—One man dead, one wounded and one unaccounted for is the result of a tragedy enacted near Greer Springs, eight miles northwest of Milton about dark last night. The tragedy was the result of a quarrel long standing between Mike Ryan and a neighbor farmer named Shubert concerning a road. Will Dixon, a hired man on the Shubert farm, was killed when he stepped between his employer and Ryan who fired a rifle. The bullet that killed Dixon passed through his body and penetrated the thigh of Shubert who was removed to a hospital at Walla Walla today for treatment. Ryan disappeared after the shooting and may be barricaded in his house but no one is yet willing to approach it. The sheriff has gone to the scene.

phone that he had no official knowledge of any such transaction having been closed.

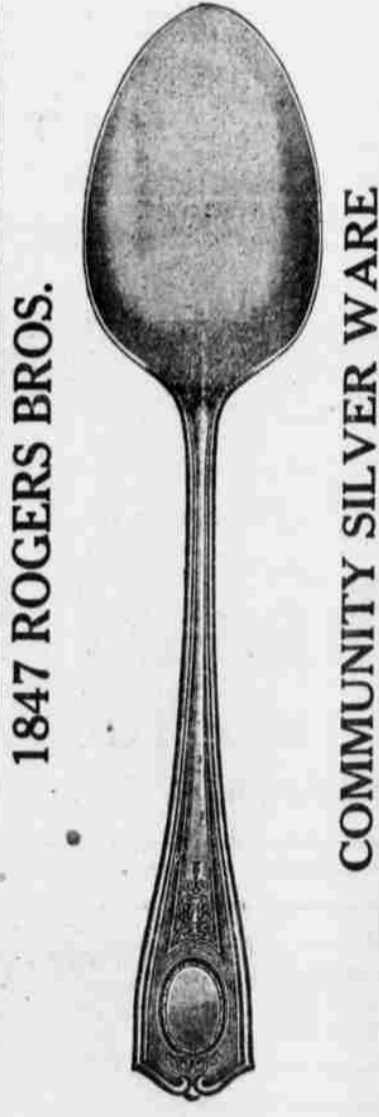
Idaho Southern Extensions.

"The Idaho Southern railway has filed certification of an increase of its capital stock from \$2,000,000 to \$3,000,000, the first step toward financing the extension of the Gooding-Milner road to Twin Falls and Oakley, Cassia county. Oakley will be the center of the proposed Goose creek irrigation project of 80,000 acres to be constructed by W. S. Kuhn and his associates, promoters of the Idaho Southern railway.

Weiser Southern Terminal.

"The Idaho Northern railway runs north from Weiser, in south Idaho, a distance of 76 miles in the direction of Grangeville, Idaho county, the southern terminus of the Northern Pacific in Idaho.

"It is reported that Northern Pacific surveyors are even now working between Grangeville and the Salmon river in the direction of Evergreen, the terminus of the Idaho Northern. It is also stated that the company purchasing the Council property secured a large amount of land in the vicinity of the Idaho Northern depot, on which buildings are located, and that those buildings are to be removed immediately. Governor Brady, railroad men and capitalists compose the company."
