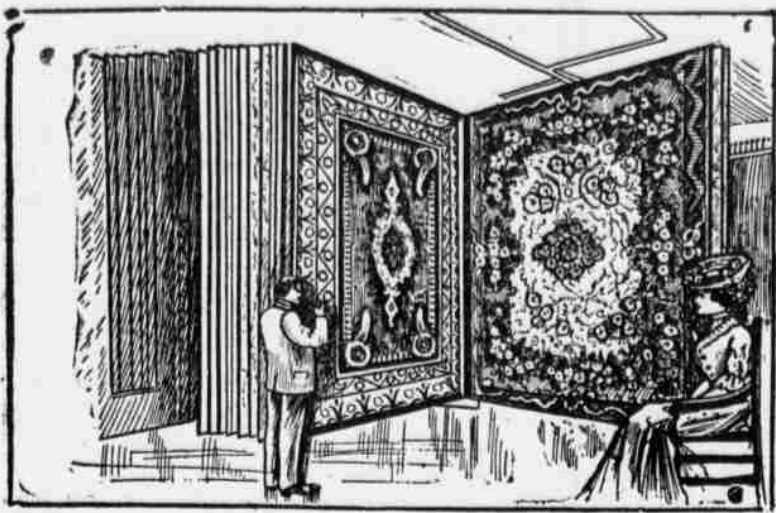

MYRTLE POINT GRADUATES.

Arrangements Made For Commence-
ment Time.

The Myrtle Point Enterprise says: "Commencement exercises of the high school and common school of Myrtle Point will be held at the Benson Opera House on Thursday, May 27, at 8 p. m. A short program of musical numbers, recitations and a drill will be given by the school, to be followed by an address to the graduating classes to be given by President Campbell of the State University at Eugene.

"The class to graduate from the Eleventh grade consists of two pupils, Claude Endicott and Dalton King.

"A class of six has completed the two year high school course and will be given diplomas covering that period of study. The members of this class are: Mabel Haughton, Cecile Miller, Grace Michael, Kate Lehnher, Clark Giles and Otto Schneider.

"A class of twenty-nine will graduate from the common school course, having completed the Eighth Grade. They are: Bertha Wade, Ada Shull, Nettie Williams, Cora Endicott, Agnes McCracken, Eva Farber, Beale Endicott, Nona Harrison, Hallie Davis, Myrl McCloskey, Bernice Chandler, Rena Chandler, Zula Michael, Catherine Way, Opal Davis, Nellie Bruner, Arthur Jones, Chester Endicott, Harry Williams, Ralph Strong, Renben Stevens, Forrest Greene, Willie Lehnher, Delos Davennort, Hallet Bargelt, Finley Michael, Lester Pollock, Stacy Panter and Lyman Rackleff.

"Besides being a remarkably large class—the largest in the county—this Eighth Grade class is a remarkably strong one. Their papers, examined by the county examining board at Coquille were found to be unusually clean and perfect. But one of the number failed to make an average of 90 per cent or over, and the general average of the class was 92.9 per cent. Only one who took the examination failed to pass. From Myrtle Point, 24 took the recent examination and 23 passed, six members of the class having passed the February examination. From Coquille 13 took the examination and 12 passed; from Bandon 19 were examined and 16 passed; from North Bend 25 took the examination and 21 passed; Marshfield was not represented."

GET MORE WATER.

New Source of Supply For Coquille
System.

COQUILLE, Ore., May 22.—The water works crew which has been working on the water main above the reservoir has now completed about 1800 feet of ditch and the work is being pushed as rapidly as possible. This main is to tap the Walker Creek branch of Rink Creek and will add about four miners' liches to the water supply of the city. The supply at the present time has proven inadequate in the summer time in past years and it is hoped that with the addition of the water from Walker Creek that the city will have sufficient for the needs of the city even in the driest months of the year.

About 2,900 feet of ditch will be necessary to carry the water from Walker creek to the reservoir. The pipe for the main came down from Portland several weeks ago, but about 700 feet of it was in the warehouse at North Bend at the time of the fire and was so badly burned as to be useless. This pipe, however, has been replaced by the company from whom it was purchased and will arrive on the Alliance next week.

DANGER OF SMOKING.

Myrtle Point Man Has Stem Driven
Into Mouth.

The Myrtle Point Enterprise says: "T. E. Dickson can now fully substantiate the argument frequently advanced by reformers that smoking a corn cob pipe is injurious to the health; in fact it has proven more than usually injurious to him. He had his old pet and standby in his mouth Wednesday while he was at work, when the bowl of the pipe was struck by a timber and the stem was driven up through the roof of his mouth. It was really a very painful injury and the services of a surgeon were required to cut out the piece of pipe stem that had become imbedded in the flesh of the roof of his mouth.

W. C. Sellmer is getting his new motion picture house almost completed. This will make two theatres of the kind for Bandon and will give our citizens plenty of opportunity to see high grade moving pictures.

The boys who came up from Coquille Saturday under the charge of Dr. Fees, the Methodist pastor at that place, suffered defeat at the hands of the Myrtle Point team by a score of 33 to 19.

G. G. Swan, who is down from his home on the East Fork says that the Harry Brothers are starting nicely on their road contract. This year's work, it is thought, will complete the grade to Brewster and it is hoped to have that section of the road in good shape in another year.

Those who have taken the initiative in providing for a Fourth of July celebration in Myrtle Point this year are making progress and it is proposed to have a citizen's meeting at a nearby date to take the proper action and get things started. The use of the Seaman tract has been secured and the work of placing the track in condition will soon be undertaken. An effort will be made to get the heavy road roller for this purpose. Permission has also been secured from the proper authorities to close Seaman avenue while the track is being used.

With the impetus that is being given toward the creation of a permanent highway over the Coos Bay wagon road, it looks as though the advantages of the Middle Fork route would be side-tracked unless supporters of that route wake up and make an effort in its favor. The development of the Coos Bay wagon route and the neglect of the Middle Fork route will make of the Coquille Valley a mere way station as far as travel by team and stage is concerned from outside points to Coos Bay, while the main line of travel would just as well be made to the benefit of all sections by the development of the Middle Fork route.

WILL IMPROVE STREETS.

Coquille Awards Contracts For Material Improvements.

The Coquille Sentinel says: "Contractor P. E. Drane started a crew of men and teams at work on Hall street north of Second street Wednesday. The street is to be graded for a distance of two blocks and is the first of the grading work which was ordered by the council some time ago. It was at first planned to plank the entire street from curb to curb but this plan was abandoned. "Taylor street is also to be graded on the same contract north of Second street, to Third street. This will be a great improvement, even more so than the grading of Hall street, as the frog pond in front of the Sentinel office has been an eyesore to every passer-by for many months.

"The contract for these two streets was let to P. E. Drane for 17½ cents per yard and the amount of earth to be moved was estimated by the engineer at about 1,400 yards on Hall street and 300 yards on Taylor street. Neither street will be planked at the present time."
