MONARCH OF THE HERD.

Magnificent Specimen of Mounted Elk On Exhibition by Marshfield Taxidermist.

J. E. Graham, the taxidermist and furrier, has recently completed one of the finest specimens of mounted animals ever seen in this section. It is a magnificent elk, a splendid Monarch of the herd, standing in the attitude of listening, alert and tense and so natural as to be almost startling. His seven point antlers are uniform and trim and the muscles stand out on his limbs in life like distinctness and he has an unusually heavy main. It is a Coos county Elk and was skinned under Mr. Graham's personal direction which permitted him to secure such an artistic finish in the mounted animal. As the new game law forbids the killing of Elk until 1919, this specimen is unusually valuable. There has been some talk of securing it for the Coos county exhibit at the Seattle fair and also some local members of the Elk lodge have suggested the matter of acquiring it for their new lodge room.
