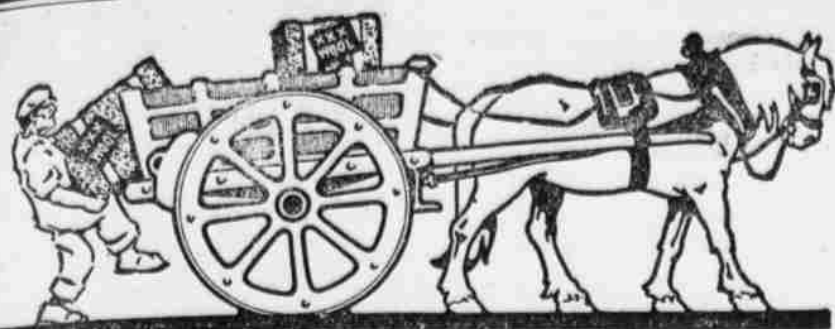

MAY AFFECT COOS BAY.

Resolution Affecting Unexpended Balances Introduced.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 25.—Senator Burton of Ohio, offered a joint resolution providing that that provision of the sundry civil act for the fiscal year 1910, requiring the unexpended balances of appropriations be converted into the treasury shall not apply to unexpended balances of the river and harbor appropriation. Unless the resolution prevails the following balances for Oregon improvements will probably lapse and go back to the treasury: Improving the mouth of the Columbia below Tongue Point, \$24,000.

Entrance to Coos Bay, \$23,000. Clatskanie River, \$300.

FOR FLORENCE ROAD.

Company Incorporated to Build Along Siuslaw.

SALEM, Ore., May 25.—Articles of incorporation for the Eugene Western Railway Company were filed with Secretary of State. The capital stock of the corporation is \$300,000 and the incorporators of record are: F. A. Anderson, F. J. Berger and Joseph Fellman. The new company, with headquarters at Eugene, proposes to construct a standard gauge railroad from Eugene westerly through Lane county to the Pacific ocean, with terminus at Florence, in Siuslaw Bay.
