Puts in Sidewalk.—D. L. Rood is putting in a cement sidewalk in front of residence property on Highland avenue materially improving the appearance of his property.

Buy Business.—It is announced that John Van Berger and George Divlipsis have bought the passenger and freighting outfits from the Lake Creamery and will operate the line to Ten Mile.

Buy Hume Horse.—W. G. E. Smith of Portland, purchased the three-year-old filly, Agnes, which made such a good showing last year, from the Hume estate for \$200. She was shipped to Portland the other day.

Mounts Head.—O. O. Lund is mounting one of the largest and best specimen steer heads ever seen in this section. The head is that of a four-year-old and is considered almost perfect, having a fine set of horns.

Move Shop.—The sheet metal works has moved from the building on South Broadway below Williams building into quarters on Broadway, north of the Mill Slough bridge, recently vacated by the wood working shop.

Lumber Shipments.—The lumber shipments from Coos county during April are given as follows: Prosper, five cargoes, 1,269,817; Coquille, 727,602; Bandon, three cargoes, 756,007; North Bend, two cargoes, 1-

440,457; Marshfield, seven cargoes, 7,868,317.

Delegates Elected.—George Ross and L. A. Wherent have been elected delegates from the Marshfield Knights of Pythias lodge to the Knights of Pythias Grand Lodge meeting at Pendleton, June 7.

Raises Fine Berries.—Coos River strawberries are now in their prime. Today Herbert Geddes brought in some samples to the Chamber of Commerce that are pronounced to be the best shown here this season.

Meet in Bandon.—The Coos county convention of the Knights of Pythias will be held in Bandon June 22. Coos Bay lodges will send large delegations. The program of the meeting has not been announced yet.

Remodel Building.—Robert Marsden, Sr., has secured a permit from the city to remodel and improve his building on North front street, across from the city hall, occupied by the Dime Moving Picture show. Extensive alterations and improvements will be made.

New Plumbing Shop.—It is announced that W. J. Smith of North Bend, who has been engaged in the plumbing business there for some time, will open a plumbing shop in Marshfield. He has secured a license as a master plumber here and expects to engage in business shortly.

Canoe Upsets.—Joe Schooley started out yesterday to enjoy a canoe ride on the Bay. In some manner, the craft upset and gave Joe his first plunge in the Bay this season. He says the water isn't as cold as it might be. Men from the dredge Oregon helped him right the canoe and he paddled ashore.

Improve Tenth street.—Judge Hall, W. U. Douglas, A. B. Daly and other property owners along Tenth street (formerly Laurel), between Central avenue and Commercial avenue, are arranging to grade and improve that street. The city council has given them permission to do the work by private contract.

Franchise Not Up.—The street car franchise was not brought up at the council meeting last night as some expected it would. Whether it was because the final copies of the ordinance, as revised at the last session, or whether the committee thought it useless until the council gets together has not been announced.

Buys Saloon.—Roy Moore has purchased the Claymore saloon from W. J. Butler, administrator of the estate of Clay Moore. The council has transferred the license held by the late Clay Moore to Roy Moore, a brother of the deceased who was associated in the business with the former. The place was reopened today.

Buys Automobile.—Dr. A. L. Houseworth has bought an automobile and today is taking a few lessons on the machine. Dorsey Kreitzer wanted him to wait until tomorrow until he could buy a football suit, a portable machine shop and engage a hospital corps and a few other side lines to prevent any delays in case the worst comes soon.

Bulkhead Troubles.—Robert Krueger stated that the complaints about the leaking of the bulkhead around his property are not justified. He built the bulkhead himself at the suggestion of Dr. Mingus because they could not get enough men to do all the work that was waiting and later he guarded it himself and stopped leaks as rapidly as possible.

Brings In Oil.—The steamer Bee arrived in last night from San Francisco with a large cargo of oil for the Standard Oil Company. She will load with lumber at the C. A. Smith Mill for San Francisco. Heretofore she has come up light but since the Czarina has cut down the number of her trips, the owners had a chance to take on the oil cargo without much inconvenience and did so.

Plan New Line.—The Siuslaw West of Florence, Oregon, says: "Mr. McCollum, agent for the Southern Pacific at Marshfield, was in Florence Tuesday and Wednesday on business. His company has been considering the question of putting on a small vessel to carry freight from Coos Bay to the smaller ports on the coast, in connection with the Breakwater."
