LEAVES A GOOD JOB TO LOSE HIS SPOUSE

Milwaukee Court Official Gives Up

\$5,000 a Year to "Find Peace."

MILWAUKEE, Wis., May 29. — Charles A. Potter, aged 57 years, court reporter in Judge Paul D. Carpenter's branch of probate court, voluntarily resigned his position worth \$5,000 a year, and left the city.

According to statements to his landlady, Mrs. W. J. Tedrick, 419 Jackson street, Mr. Potter fled the city to escape domestic troubles. His wife who, he said, had deserted him several years ago, found that he was in Milwaukee and came here. Then troubles began again.

He told Judge Carpenter that he was going to resign, as he was "ready to throw up everything in order to find peace." Judge Carpenter remonstrated with him, but he was firm and handed in his written resignation before he left.

Potter left the city on an interurban car, thus eluding officers at two stations placed by his wife to take him in charge if he attempted to

leave the city, it is said.

Potter, an expert stenographer, came to Milwaukee from Omaha, Neb., about three years ago, and secured the position in Judge Carpenter's court. He received a salary of \$3,000, which, with fees of 5 cents a folio for transcripts, made his income about \$5,000 a year.

It is said Potter had money coming from the county for work done this month, but he did not stop to collect it. He was so thorough with his work, however, that even the transcripts of evidence taken in court were written and filed before he left.

Potter's wife, it is said, deserted him in Illinois several years ago. Later she returned to him in Omaha and an arrangement was effected whereby he was to pay her \$50 a month and also contribute to the support of the three children. About four weeks ago Mrs. Potter heard that her husband was in Milwaukee and followed him here.

No one knew Potter had left except Judge Carpenter and Miss Bauman, Potter's stenographer.

LIMA, Ohio, May 28. — That romance is not dead was shown in a quiet marriage performed in the village church at West Minister, this county. Because of family disputes, Mrs. Margaret Davis, now aged 43, left her husband Daniel L. Davis, now 51 years old, just 16 years ago. She secured a divorce on grounds of cruelty.

In a dream Davis said he had a

revelation from heaven telling him that both had erred and reminding him that it would be the sixteenth anniversary of the separation through law. Driving to the home of his former wife, he asked her to be his wife again, and in tears, she accepted. The couple came here and secured a license, and in the presence of only a few friends, they spoke again their vows on the same church altar where they pledged their troth years ago.

THE BIGGEST BABY IN THE WHOLE WIDE WORLD

Three-year-Old Weighs One Hundred and Twenty-Five Pounds.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., May 28. — "The biggest baby in the world" lives at 1617 Washington avenue, this city. He is John Wilson Webb, three years old, and weighs 125 pounds. His mother, who weighs 200 pounds, finds it difficult to carry the baby Jumbo around in her arms, but says that every day she handles him her strength increases.

She occasionally takes John Wilson across her lap and applies the maternal slipper, but confesses that it is hard work.

Mrs. Wilson is a widow and her infant son contributes to her support. Sometimes he earns \$10 a day in public exhibitions as "the biggest baby in the world." The father, who died recently, weighed about 250 pounds.
