Gets Mail Contract.—B. F. Pray, engineer on the launch Rita, has secured the contract for carrying the mail between the Marshfield and Eastside postoffices, effective June 7.

McCann Coming.—W. O. McCann, the Eureka contractor who put in the bituminous rock paving here last season, is expected here next week from Eureka on business and pleasure.

Gets Big Contract.—Chas. Masters, formerly of Masters & McLain, has secured a \$35,000 street improvement contract in Portland. This is one of the big contracts of the season there.

Buys Launch Fish.—John S. Anderson of Willapa Harbor, has purchased Al Nichols' sea-going launch Fish. He will fit her up for the Rogue River-Coos Bay salmon trade which will open June 15.

LITTLE TALKS ABOUT TOWN

A GRIST OF COOS BAY GOS-SIP GATHERED HERE AND THERE ABOUT THINGS OF PASSING INTEREST.

"The chief revenues of the post-office department are derived from sales of stamps, stamped envelopes, postal cards and so forth," remarked a United States Inspector. "Uncle Sam's postage stamps are manufactured by the bureau of engraving and printing at Washington; the stamped envelopes and newspapers wrappers are made under departmental supervision, under contract, by a private corporation whose factory is located at Dayton, Ohio, while his postal cards are made under similar conditions at Rumford, Me. From these points distribution is made to postoffices throughout the country upon requisition of postmasters duly approved by the department. Postage-stamped paper issued during the year 1908, aggregated \$176,374,190.24, an increase of \$3,967,713.97 over 1907. The total number of pieces of stamped paper was 9,772,059,664, an increase of 440,140,609; books of stamps, 18,213,310, an increase of 520,510. That the issue of postage stamps will cross the ten-billion mark during the fiscal year 1909 is confidently anticipated."

'B' STREET LOT CASE.

Judge Wolverton Returns Warrant to Be Changed.

Judge Wolverton has sent the city's general fund warrant for \$7,500 back to City Recorder Butler to be made payable to the clerk of the federal court at Portland instead of to the C. A. Smith Company as it was originally drawn to pay the city's share of the cost of the lot to open 'B' street to the waterfront. While it is not definitely known here, it is understood that the court is taking this means of ascertaining whether the warrant can be cashed before he issues an order finally disposing of the case. The C. A. Smith Company is understood to have objected to taking the warrant. The remaining \$3,000 needed to secure the lot was put up by property owners near the corner who would be benefited by having the street opened. They subscribed the following amounts: H. H. McPherson, \$800; John W. Butler, \$800; Flanagan & Bennett, \$500; Merchant estate, \$500; Gow Why, \$250; Jas L. Ferrey, \$150.
