Had Blood Poison.—Ivy Condon has been suffering from an attack of blood poisoning in his hand and arm. It is believed that he has passed the critical stage and will recover rapidly. He is at his ranch on North Coos River.

Go to Yreka.—J. B. Hibbard, who until recently was identified with the Marshfield Hand and Steam Laundry, and J. W. Lees, who has been conducting a barber shop on South Broadway, will leave shortly for Yreka, Cal., where they will engage in the laundry business.

Organize Port.—The residents of the lower Siuslaw voted this week to organize the Port of the Siuslaw securing a commission similar to the Coos Bay Port Commission. It is planned to spend \$100,000 improving the bar and harbor at Florence within the next year.

Wed In Coquille.—Miss Fenetta Fenoglio Anselmo, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. Anselmo of Bandon, and H. Dunkley, a well-known Beaver Hill young man were married at Coquille this morning by Justice Holden. They will reside at Beaver Hill. The bride is one of the best known and popular young women of Bandon.

Bishop's Wife Better.—Portland papers reaching here this morning announced that Mrs. Scadding, wife of the Episcopal bishop of Oregon, had been taken suddenly and seriously ill of appendicitis. J. W. Bennett immediately wired to ascertain her condition and received the following reply from Bishop Scadding this afternoon: "Slight change for better. Nothing very decided. Much pain."

Makes Assignment.—The Oregon Electric Supply Company, with houses in Marshfield and North Bend,

has made an assignment to J. H. Gardiner of the First National Bank of North Bend for the benefit of creditors. Sometime ago, it is now claimed Messrs. Mills and Jenkins disposed of their interest to D. D. Dobbins who, after making the assignment, departed for a point unknown. Mr. Gardiner says that the company's books are in bad shape. It is not believed that the local liabilities of the firm is large although supply houses are said to have considerable coming.

Will Wed In East.—Superintendent T. C. Russell of the Beaver Hill mines, left on the Breakwater today to visit his old home in Wyoming. While Mr. Russell did not announce, friends have strong convictions that he will return with a bride.

May Play Sunday.—If the Marshfield diamond dries sufficiently, Marshfield and North Bend will play ball here tomorrow afternoon. However, the rain the last few days has soaked the grounds pretty thoroughly and Manager Burkhardt has little hope that it will be in condition for the game.

Discuss Municipal Plant.—At the meeting of the Citizens League last evening, Messrs. Copple and Watkins spoke in favor of a municipal electric lighting and heating plant while I. S. Smith and councilman Albrecht spoke in favor of private ownership of such utilities. During the debate, Messrs. Watkins and Copple charged that the city of Marshfield is now paying more for the electric arc lights services than a private individual would have to pay for the same amount of electricity at the prevailing rates here. No action was taken on the matter.

Have Animated Session.—The executive committee of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce, had one of the most animated sessions in its history yesterday afternoon when matters pertaining to the Port Commission and the railway matter were brought up to adjust differences of opinion among the members regarding them. After the matters had been debated pro and con for a couple of hours, the meeting adjourned without any action being taken, it being understood that as the differences had been threshed out, everybody would get together and boost.

No Action Taken.—J. W. Bennett, chairman of the Marshfield school board, today called a special meeting of that body to consider petitions from the high school teachers and a remonstrance petition concerning a proposed change in high school regulations. The teachers asked the system of excusing honor pupils from the examinations be discontinued and all the high school pupils signed a petition asking that it remain unchanged. The school board decided that as there is to be a new high school principal next year, it was best to postpone action in the matter until she has a chance to express her views.

The Roseburg Review says: "Coos Bay people are raising a fund of \$25,000 for surveying a railroad line from there to Boise, Idaho, via Roseburg. Messrs. Somers and Haas are securing rights of way over the county roads for an electric line between the same points and M. W. Purdy, who for months past has been endeavoring to get a franchise for a car line over Roseburg's streets, has a party of surveyors at work on the Hubbard Creek-Coos river route. Others are also 'investigating,' so it looks as if there might be some real developments before long on that long-talked-of railroad to Coos Bay. And when any of these lines are started, Mr. Harriman can be depended upon to 'get busy' with his line from Drain. All right, there's plenty of room for both roads and traffic will soon be developed to keep them busy. This section of Oregon has long lain like a slumbering giant, but it looks as if the awakening is near at hand."
