readiness so that the actual construction can be started as soon as the weather will permit next spring.

Offer Big Bonuses.

More enthusiasm is now shown over the project than at any time since its inception.

Today a number of local people who own considerable property here have been talking of starting a bonus fund. One man has promised to give at least \$10,000 as soon as the road is completed and several have indicated that they would give \$5,000 or upwards apiece. A prominent Roseburg man stated the other day that he was confident that Roseburg would grant a bonus of \$150,000 or \$200,000 for the road. With these pledges in sight, little difficulty in financing the project is anticipated when the survey and right of way is secured.
