

WARM TRIBUTE FROM VETERAN

LEE WEBSTER OF EMPIRE, EXPRESSES APPRECIATION OF BAKER POST G. A. R. FOR MEMORIAL DAY COURTESIES.

Lee Webster of Baker Post, G. A. R., has written a warm letter of appreciation to the Rev. G. S. Clevinger, pastor of the First Baptist church, here for the courtesies extended the veterans by Mr. Clevinger and his congregation in the Memorial Day exercises Sunday. Mr. Webster took a prominent part in the exercises Sunday, which was accidentally omitted from The Times' account of the program. He read Lincoln's Gettysburg address which struck a responsive chord in the assemblage. Mr. Webster was a member of Company B, 13th Massachusetts, and with Major Tower of Empire his commander at the time, was taken prisoner at Gettysburg.

Mr. Webster's letter to Rev. Clevinger is as follows:

"The thanks, which I beg to personally express to yourself, and through you to the officers of your church, for the loyal treatment accorded by all, on Memorial day, to the members of Baker Post No. 8, Dept. of Oregon, Grand Army of the Republic, ought properly, and doubtless will be tendered you by the Post membership, and to Professor Mills and his able choir, we offer heartfelt thanks for the beautiful song, and instrumental service upon that occasion so dear to the old soldier:

"Who, most of us, comrades, are feeble old cripples,
Our hair growing gray with fast fleeting time
But tho' still in this world our muster roll
Shortens, we know it grows longer
In a happier clime."

"And such music as we listened to, such decorations as greeted our vision, blending with the patriotic utterances of yourself, who need them not to proclaim you as a prototype of the martyred 'Lincoln' who 'builds better than he knew' when he said: 'The world will little note, nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here.' These and more tending to cheer the few remaining years of the old 'Veterans' who with yourself would take a text from that grand address on the nineteenth day of November 1863, that 'government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth.' So mote it be."

REV. R. G. SUMMERLIN WILL GO TO CONFERENCE

North Bend United Brethren Pastor Will Attend Annual Meeting of Denomination at Philomath.

Rev. R. G. Summerlin, pastor of the United Brethren church at North Bend will leave next Monday to attend the annual conference of that denomination which will be held at Philomath, Oregon. The conference will open June 11, and will necessitate the absence of Rev. Summerlin for about a month. His family will accompany him.

At the conference, pastors for the various parishes are appointed for the ensuing year. There have been rumors that Rev. Summerlin would be transferred to another charge, but his congregation are anxious to retain him at North Bend. It is possible that the United Brethren will select some one to attend the Philomath conference to see that he is returned. Mr. Strawn has been talked of as the delegate. Rev. Summerlin has been stationed at North Bend for six years and has done excellent work on the Bay, winning many friends outside of his congregation who would be sorry to see him transferred from here.

His last services on the Bay before the conference will be held next Sunday. During the conference, it is likely that the Rev. F. M. Dakin who recently came to the Bay from Pennsylvania will occupy the United Brethren pulpit on the Bay.

Waterworks gulch" for their Fourth of July celebration.

Tom Hall's request that Laurel or Tenth street north of Prospect or Commercial avenue be improved only 36 feet wide was referred to the city engineer and street committee to investigate.

The city engineer was instructed to prepare the preliminary ordinances for starting work on the South Marshfield sewage system.

A resolution declaring the council's intention to improve Commercial avenue from Broadway to Fourth street and Second, Third and Fourth streets, where they have been filled by the dredge, was passed. The action was taken on F. A. Sacchi's request that sidewalks be ordered put in. The sidewalks are to be twelve feet wide and of lumber, the fill next to the bulkhead not being solid enough to support any other material. The property owners are given the privilege of putting in their own walks.

There was talk of including Central avenue west of Second street, but as some of the property owners have expressed a desire to have bituminous rock paving put in there, the council delayed action on it.

June 16th was the date set for adjusting the mixup over the North Cedar street assessments and improvement.
